Planning Guide for Marriage Services and Commitment Ceremonies





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Congratulations and best wishes! We at Holy Trinity are eager to celebrate this special day with you and to assist you in preparing both for your service and your new partnership together.

The joy of sharing our lives with others has always been affirmed in our Christian tradition. Entering into covenant with another is one important way that two people may share their lives. It is a relationship that requires constant care and cultivation, and it is intended to develop and protect mutual trust between partners. Such relationships are also intended to be a blessing for the community and the world.

With public promises of love, trust, honesty, and commitment, this service marks the beginning of a covenant. In this festive worship service, everyone gathered is asked to join the couple in asking for God's blessing in their life together. Family and friends also pledge their support and encouragement to the couple.

The congregation of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church takes both your relationship *and* this worship service very seriously. Therefore every effort is made to preserve the integrity of the service that marks the beginning of the covenant relationship. This means that there should be an atmosphere of worship and thanksgiving during the entire service.

At least one party should be an active worshipping member of Holy Trinity at the time of scheduling the ceremony. If neither is an *active* member at the time the service is scheduled, non-member rates will apply. Out of consideration for Holy Trinity members, a nonmember service will be scheduled no more than 10 months in advance. Your status as a member or non-member is determined at the time you reserve the date. Celebrating this important day at Holy Trinity involves the following steps:

1. Meet with the Pastor

The pastor will help you prepare for your life together and officiate at your service. During your first meeting, you will begin by choosing a date that is acceptable to both you and the pastor. In order to reserve a date, non-members are required to make a \$200 deposit at this time. If there are more than two attendants or more then 20 guests, a rehearsal is necessary and should also be scheduled at this time. Please inform your attendants to arrive onehalf hour before scheduled rehearsal time. All attendants and parents of the couple must be in attendance. Rehearsals are usually held the evening before the ceremony and are conducted by the pastor. The organist is not in attendance at this time. Please plan on 45-60 minutes for rehearsal.

2. Take the Prepare Inventory

You will be required to complete the *Prepare* personal awareness inventory, developed by Life Innovations, at least three months prior to your service date. This inventory takes about 40 minutes. It is not a test but simply a way that you can discover areas of strength as well as needs that you have as individuals and as a couple. The results will often inspire some good discussion!

3. Participate in Counseling

This includes the use of *Prepare*. Couples are expected to meet with the pastor at least three times before the service. The sessions will make use of the *Prepare* inventory and results and will address various issues related to building and nurturing a strong relationship.

4. Plan the Service

As stated above, we take both your relationship and the ceremony very seriously, and the music and readings should contribute to the atmosphere of worship. The pastor will help you through the process of planning a meaningful service.

Liturgy

The ceremony is, first of all, a worship service. It is an occasion for worship and praise, not just an event for spectators to watch. The usual order of service in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (page 286) is not a rigid form. The rite is characterized by variety and flexibility, so that it may be adapted for a variety of situations. Feel free to discuss the liturgical options with the pastor.

It is not necessary to provide bulletins for the service, but doing so can help the congregation to participate more fully. It is also a way to identify the attendants and other service participants. The church office does not produce bulletins, but the pastor will help you identify the parts of the service to include in a bulletin, if you choose to print one.

The Music

Music plays a major part in our praise and worship of God. We will work with you to find music that is both meaningful to you and appropriate for a worship service.

Instrumental and vocal soloists can often add a beautiful richness to the service. However, the presence of soloists should not preclude the singing of congregational hymns. When people gather for this celebration, they will have the opportunity to witness the beginning of a covenant and to express joy and praise to God. Hymns are wonderful ways this expression might be made.

To assist you in selecting music, Holy Trinity's organist and soloists have recordings of solos, processionals, and recessionals from which you may choose. If you do not find these selections to your liking or if you have already chosen your music, the pastor and/or Holy Trinity's organist will meet with you either to offer more selections for your consideration or to review the music you have chosen.

If soloists are used, special care must be taken to assure that the music is performed with reasonably high quality. Soloists should be selected on the basis of their musical ability and not on the primary basis of personal friendship. Holy Trinity does have access to excellent musicians, both vocal and instrumental. The staff would be pleased to make arrangements for you in this regard.

The Vows/Exchanging Promises

You may wish to write your vows. They should be consistent with biblical notions of faithfulness in relationship and should make clear that the promises are a lifelong commitment. The pastor must approve the wording you choose if it is not one of the forms below. I take you; _____, to be my wife/husband/partner from this day forward, to join with you and share all that is to come, and I promise to faithful to you until death parts us.

I take you, <u>name</u>, to be my wife/husband/partner, and these things I promise you: I will be faithful to you and honest with you; I will respect, trust, help and care for you; I will share my life with you; I will forgive you as we have been forgiven; and I will try with you better to understand ourselves, the world and God; through the best and worst of what is to come until death parts us.

In the presence of God and this community, I, _____, take you, _____, to be my wife/husband/partner; to have and to hold from this day forward, in joy and in sorrow, in plenty and in want, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, as long as we both shall live. This is my solemn vow.

_____, I take you to be my wife/husband/partner from this time onward, to join with you and to share all that is to come, and to give and to receive, to speak and to listen, to inspire and to respond, and in all circumstances of our life together to be loyal to you with my whole life and with all my being until death parts us.

5. Obtain Your Marriage License

Minnesota State Law requires couples to secure a license to marry. You may apply at any Clerk of Court office in the state. You must produce proof of age. Please note: after application, it takes about 7-10 business days to receive your license.

6. Pay all Church and Personnel Fees

The balance of all church and personnel fees is due in the church office two weeks prior to your service. Pay all fees in one check made payable to Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. If you have asked a friend to sing or have arranged for a vocalist from outside the church, you will be responsible for reimbursing them.

Fees for Reception

The Community Room or gym may be used for reception. The fee is determined by length of time used.

The Church Staff assumes the responsibility for setting up tables and chairs in the reception area.

Other Guidelines and Suggestions

1. Children

Children bring joy to any occasion. All children need a responsible adult to supervise them at the rehearsal and the day of the ceremony. This will take any pressure off you as a couple and ensure their safety.

2. Photography

It is suggested that posing for pictures be done before the guests arrive. This permits the couple and attendants to join the guests at the reception without delay. A personal time for the couple to see each other before the photos is given in a quiet place without interruption from the photographer, attendants, or family members. You should designate one person to facilitate this. Pictures in the sanctuary are limited to two hours and will end 45 minutes before the service for an opportunity for the couple and attendants to prepare for the ceremony. This is a time for quiet, meditation, prayer, or relaxation. They shall be uninterrupted by any outside party and remain in one location so that the service may start on time.

The photographer is not allowed to use flash during the service. Photographers are to be inconspicuous during the service, not going past the front pews or on the chancel/altar area. Audio-visual is allowed during the service; however, video camera operators are not permitted to move about during the ceremony. Video cameras should be set up before service, preferably in the balcony, and left running.

3. Dressing Areas

The Mary Martha Room and library are both available to the couple and attendants for changing. Everything must be removed from these rooms before the service begins. It is the responsibility of those using the rooms to arrange for the care of their property before, during, and after the ceremony. Leave all valuable personal belongings and gifts in the care of parents, friends, or attendants during the service. The church is not responsible for lost or stolen articles.

4. Clean Up

Since you and the attendants will be very busy the day of the service, plan for a couple of people to stay afterward to put everything back the way it was when you arrived and pick up any items that may have been forgotten.

5. Suggestion Concerning Gifts

In the past, some couples have taken steps to limit the giving of traditional gifts. Sometimes guests have been encouraged to provide a contribution to the World Hunger Appeal or another charity in honor of one's marriage.

Additional Etiquette and Church Regulations

This service will be a worship service of the church. Participants and guests should conduct themselves accordingly. The pastor reserves the right to halt any ceremony when a member of the party or a guest in the church is not conducting him/herself with propriety.

We do not allow throwing rice or birdseed in the church building or outside the building. It is hazardous on floors and difficult to clean up.

No food or beverage is allowed in the church sanctuary. If the party has food or beverage before the service, it should stay in the dressing rooms or Community Room.

The entire Holy Trinity building is a non-smoking area, and the use of alcoholic beverages is prohibited.

Some frequently asked questions:

- **1.** How many ushers will we need? If you are planning for more than 100 guests, you will need at least three ushers.
- 2. Will we need to order altar flowers? It is best to be modest - a single, simple arrangement for the right side of the altar is sufficient.
- **3. We would like a candlelight service. May we use the candelabras or aisle candleholders?** Yes. Arrange with the pastor when you are planning your service. We will provide candles.

4. May we tape the service?

Yes, but a video recorder must remain stationary and should be set up in the balcony. An audio-tape can be made through our sound system. No flash pictures are allowed.

5. Who do we contact for last-minute changes? If there is a last-minute scheduling change, you should contact the pastor, 612-729-8358.

6. May we have our reception at the church?

Yes. You are welcome to use the church for your reception. There is an additional fee (see fee schedule above). The church does have dishes, bowls, and silverware for you to use. Alcoholic beverages are not allowed.
