MARCHING FOR CREATION

Along with over 310,000 people, I attended the People's Climate March in New York City on Sunday September 21. Minnesotans arrived via planes, trains, automobiles, a van, and six overflowing buses, thanks to groups like MN350, MNIPL (Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light), Citizen's Climate Lobby, Lutheran Churches, and Seward School.

The day of the march was humid but blissfully overcast, as heat was predicted. In the early morning, we prepared for the historical march by carrying beautifully prepared artwork and puppets onto pre-assigned blocks on Central Park West. As the morning progressed, hundreds of thousands joined in. Police were everywhere, and helicopters buzzed overhead, but everything I saw and heard reported was non-violent.

On my block, caribou, butterflies, banners, and the black carbon ghostly mask representing tar sands oil rose to life as activists arrived. For 35 blocks, other colorful displays were appearing.

By late morning, crowds of young and old were in place, and joy at the solidarity and turnout overflowed into chants. We waited, standing in place for 4-1/2 hours. Our voices were strongest when many activists against oil extraction—tar sands and fracking—combined chants.

The front of the march began at 11:30. The moment of silence at noon for those who have already experienced the impacts of climate change was breathtaking. So many packed side streets funneled into the main flow that 80th Street, where the tar sands "bloc" stood, did not begin to move until 3:30 p.m. Feet sore, vocal cords aching, we cheered as we finally moved into history. In street theater, resistance could defeat the tar sands monster, allowing the butterflies to again fly freely. We marched past my former NYC congregation (also called Holy Trinity Lutheran), Fox News studios, and Times Square. We exceeded the march permit time, the physical limits of our voices and stamina, as well as all estimates of our numbers.

Among scientists, the debate about whether climate change exists is over. For each month of the past 28 years we have exceeded the average temperature record for that month. We are stealing our children's future, and the 50,000 youth who attended the march are painfully aware of this dilemma. Although we don't know exactly how soon we must take huge reductions in carbon emissions, we all must cut our carbon fuel use (coal, oil, and natural gas) as quickly as possible now, in our lifetime.

The Creation Care Team is initiating climate conversations within the congregation. What do you value most? How will you feel when that is impacted by climate change? What steps do you think we should take within the congregation? Maybe it's time to talk about it with one another.
