## LET THE LITTLE CHILDREN COME

If you have young children in your house, I want to thank you for bringing them to church. I know how difficult Sunday mornings can be with little ones. Some parents have said that bringing their kids to worship is about the hardest thing they do during the week. But it really does matter. It matters to your child's developing faith life. It matters to the other kids who don't want to be the only ones in the pews. It matters to the rest of us whose worship is enriched by their presence and the reminder of the wonderful diversity of God's worshiping community. That's why we want to help you in your challenging task of guiding children to worship on Sunday mornings. We have activity bags and children's books you can bring into the sanctuary, and there's always the nursery down the hall for when you need that, too. Whatever happens, please know that Pastor Ingrid and I are grateful for you and your children in worship, no matter how much they squirm, giggle, or squeal. Thank you.

If you do not have children at home, then we would like to encourage you to consider sharing your pew this Sunday with someone else's child. Take a Sunday to help a child learn about worship by sitting with them and being a guide for them. It may not be right for every child, so ask a parent what they think. For many kids, sitting in a new part of the sanctuary with different adults around them could give them a new perspective on the worship service. Maybe they'll pay attention a little more. Maybe they'll feel a little more grown up and more like an active participant in the congregation. At the very least, they'll be reminded that there are other adults at church who know them and care about them. And we'll all be reminded that the kids who show up on Sunday mornings belong to all of us.

The Kleven family led our reflection during one of our Wednesday Evening Prayer services last Lent. Here's part of what Kari shared about the story of Abraham and Isaac and a faith in God that gets passed down through generations.

Abraham is blessed, and his and Sarah's descendants multiply as the stars of heaven. And here we are, generations later, looking back on where we came from, living day by day, raising the next stars in our own little line of descendants, every once in a while being reminded how much they don't belong to us really, even as we pour our whole hearts into doing the best we can to raise them faithfully. Part of that for us has been bringing them to church. Now nothing seems very difficult when compared with what Abraham went through, but hey, sitting in the pews with young children can be tough!

My thinking lately has been that if we did all that work to figure out how to be in services together during those squirmy years, we ought to be reaping the benefits now, when they can mostly sit still, and it is just a pleasure to be next to them for an hour. So I say to them clearly, I think, how much I want them to come to church with us so we can worship together. Sometimes, maybe even often, they come because they know we want them to. And that's fine. We appreciate it. And sometimes I say that we don't go just for ourselves anyway, expecting to get inspired or comforted or whatever else we think we may need or want—though often those things happen—but we go because we are a part of this community and it's just what we do.

Now I know that coming to church is only one expression of faith, and hopefully Tom and I show our kids through our words and actions how we try to live into our identities as children as God and live by the example of Jesus. But they also see how deeply flawed we are, as kids really do see the worst of their parents. So we need them to see you all, too, in your journeys as Abraham's descendants. And I tell them that people like to see young people in church. It makes them feel hopeful. So we show up, and we don't know what might come our way; maybe it's an encouraging message, or a good conversation, or a particularly good snack in the Community Room.

It is a gift to be the church with all of you. Thank you for showing up!
