### AMMPARO ADVOCACY REPORT

Holy Trinity's AMMPARO (*Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities*) Working Group identifies unaccompanied minor migrants in our community who are in need of accompaniment in areas such as legal appointments, or who need help meeting basic physical, educational, and/or emotional-social needs. This team also prays and advocates for just immigration policies, including responding to the ELCA and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service requests for advocacy. The following is an excerpt from the AMMPARO US Network Advocacy Report dated January 12, 2022:

#### LEGISLATION

**Citizenship:** *Build Back Better* negotiations fell through at the end of 2021, after disagreements about topline in the Senate. The *Build Back Better* Act included temporary work authorization and protection from deportation for around 7 million undocumented immigrants. ELCA Advocacy assisted with the delivery of a letter from nearly 30 ELCA Bishops to Congress urging swift passage, as well as the prioritization of permanent immigration protection.

#### ASYLUM & BORDER

**Supreme Court Considers "Indefinite Detention:"** Did you know that ICE is not legally required to detain most migrants? For decades, ICE has not always exercised discretion resulting in unnecessary and long-term detention on thousands. Now, the Supreme Court is considering whether immigrants held in detention for long periods of time (and in some cases, without an end in sight) may be released on bond as their cases move forward.

**Title 42:** The Biden Administration has continued to employ Title 42, a public health order originating in the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), expel most migrants at the U.S.-Mexico border. Since March 2020, when the order went into effect, over 1.5 million migrants have been expelled. The surge in COVID-19 cases due to the more transmissible Omicron variant, is expected to delay the withdrawal of this policy, although this is not based on evidence, as public health experts [have argued](#).

#### ADVOCACY PRIORITIES \*NEW\*

Developed with our companions and secular partners in Central America and Mexico, these advocacy priorities reflect a shared awareness of factors that influence how individuals experience human mobility in the Western hemisphere, particularly in Latin America. Available online in [Resources](#).

- Nations that protect persons in situations of human mobility and do not infringe on their rights;

The liturgy was created in response to consistent requests for more expansive images for God in worship. - More competent, more transparent and corruption-free governments in the countries of the Northern Triangle of Central America;
- Linking forced internal displacement and irregular migration in Northern Central America;
- People in human mobility are bearers of hope.
