Notes from the March 21 Council Meeting

In the action-packed March Council meeting, the group:

- Reviewed the final version of the Interim document, soon to be shared with the congregation
- Discussed the relationship between the Council and the Personnel Committee
- Voted to move forward on several of the recommendations from the Stepping Out in Faith Our Shared Home working group, specifically:
 - Authorizing up to \$100,000 from the Stepping Out in Faith dedicated funds to be spent on upgrading the sanctuary by replacing pews with chairs in the front two rows, improving lighting and sound systems, and creating a "prayground" space for children where the children's activity table currently stands
 - Authorizing the creation of a short-term task force which includes young members, to develop the concept of the "prayground"
 - Authorizing up to \$10,000 to be spent to contract with the Miller Dunwiddie architecture firm to develop drawings that give the congregation the opportunity to imagine second floor improvements to the education spaces, Community Room and kitchenette, and bathrooms.

After all the excellent work done by the Our Shared Home working group, it is exciting to move forward with some of their recommendations! If you want more detail regarding any of these recommendations, please reference the <u>2023 Annual Report</u>.

HOLY WEEK 2023



Sunday, April 2—Palm Sunday

Worship services of Holy Communion at 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. begin with shouts of Hosanna! as we recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to disrupt powers of violence and oppression. Our 11:00 procession will begin outside near the Rain Garden.

Thursday, April 6—Maundy Thursday

All are welcome to gather for supper in the Community Room at 5:30 p.m. At 7:00 p.m., we'll move downstairs to the Bartsch Room to begin our observance of the Three Days. The liturgy on this day contains the elements that define Christianity: the church announces that sins are forgiven; we approach one another and God in vulnerability through foot washing; money is collected for the care of the neighbor; and we share Holy Communion, the meal that celebrates the living presence of Jesus among us. Children's Choir and Trinity Singers will help lead music for the worship.

Friday, April 7—Good Friday

The night's liturgy tells the story of Jesus' Passion. Tonight, we meet Jesus at the foot of the cross. As we grieve his death, we voice our lives' laments. Even in the sorrow of this day, we trust in the resurrection promises given to us. We leave tonight's service in silence. The service begins at 7:00 p.m. in the Bartsch Room. The Adult Choir will lead our singing.

Saturday, April 8—Vigil of Easter

Gathered together in the womb of night, we retell the stories of our faith, celebrate Christ's resurrection, and are renewed in the gift of baptism. A small group ensemble and soloists will lead the Easter Vigil, which will begin in the Bartsch Room this year at 5:00 p.m. so that families with young children can participate!

Sunday, April 9—Easter Sunday

Jesus is alive and with us! We gather for festival worship services of Holy Communion at 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. to celebrate this good news. The adult choirs, along with brass ensemble will help to lead worship. Christ is risen! Let us rejoice!
