Yudelkis' Journey

Theirs is a story of a long and winding journey in search of home. It's an exodus story of emigration and a gospel story of new beginnings. It's a tale of courage and persistence in the face of dangers, barriers, unknowns, and long delays. And it's a story of the interconnectedness of God's people and the power of God's love.

It was the summer of 2020 when Yudelkis and her six-year-old daughter Melody found temporary shelter at Trinity on Lake apartments. They had just arrived in Minnesota after a journey from Cuba that spanned *thirteen* countries and more than two and a half years. When I first met Yudelkis, I remember sensing both immense exhaustion and great relief at having arrived at yet another new beginning. The most recent leg of the journey had taken them across the US-Mexico border to an immigration detention center in Texas where she was granted "parole," fitted with a tracking device, and put on a bus to Minnesota. Like many immigrants, her "sponsor" here in Minnesota was a family connection, but also essentially a stranger to her. Yudelkis and Melody had arrived in Minneapolis in the early stages of a global pandemic and found themselves in the heart of a neighborhood still reeling from the killing of George Floyd and deeply changed by the uprising that had followed just two months before their arrival. And here in this place, they also found welcome. During that



summer, Holy Trinity was serving as a food/supply distribution site. Yudelkis and Melody visited on the day when backpacks and school supplies were being distributed, ripe with hope that Melody would finally be able to attend school. Yudelkis set about the business of building a new life with a tenacity that amazed me.

As I got to know Yudelkis, I began to understand the commitment she had made to herself to find a country where her daughter could be fully documented and a place where she could grow up with hope for the future. Yudelkis had left her home with this dream...not knowing which country that might be, or where exactly their journey would take them. Along with all the hardships and moments of tremendous fear, she has

beautiful stories of being welcomed and protected by strangers who became friends. She talked about feeling like she could stay in several countries along her journey, but if a pathway to legal, permanent residence was not possible, she knew she had to continue on the quest for country. Here in



Minnesota, Yudelkis and Melody found the support they needed to realize that dream. The visit to the food distribution site with backpacks and food to share sparked a conversation that led not only to my friendship with Yudelkis, but to a connection to a church community who generously gave funds for housing and a phone with no questions asked. A visit to CLUES led to wrap-around case management that opened many doors of friendship and caring services. The Advocates for Human Rights offered

connections to pro-bono legal services. Long term shelter was found through the Jonathan House program of the International Association for Refugees. A public school welcomed Melody and taught her in her native language as well as teaching her English. The same school offered Yudelkis employment and a place where she could use her many gifts as soon as her work permit was secured. County programs provided health care and food assistance. The list goes on.

Now, five years after leaving her country of origin, the coveted permanent residency status has been secured. More new beginnings. Yudelkis recently decided to begin this next phase in Miami where she has family and a longtime friend. As we said farewell for now, she expressed her deep gratitude for the tangible welcome she received here in Minnesota. She is forever grateful for the money that provided for many smaller needs in the past two years, and that she was able to save the rest while living at Jonathan House. Now that money provides them rent for two months so that she and Melody can get settled in a home of their own. With gratitude they continue the long and winding journey.

NEW DINNERWARE AND FLATWARE AT HOLY TRINITY

After much discussion, the dinnerware/flatware committee (Sandy Hoverson, Carol Johnson, and Sue Roberts) has procured new flatware and plates for Holy Trinity. One goal was to find something lighter and less bulky than the previous china plates. We chose two sizes of Corelle plates—dinner and salad. The plates stack well, they're easy to carry, they are nearly unbreakable, and they are manufactured in the United States. The all-white plate will work with nearly every color placemat or tablecloth.

- The flatware is Oneida Lonsdale stainless steel. It was chosen for its clean, smooth lines and comfort when holding. It replaces mismatched flatware that was given to the Lutheran Social Services Refugee Relief program.
- The new cups are 8-oz. glass cups from Ikea. The cups are small enough to fit in our existing cup racks. They will not show coffee stains. And they will coordinate with any placemat or tablecloth on a set table.
- In addition to dinnerware, you will see new flower vases from Ikea (replacing old mismatched vases) and new coffee thermal pots.

MANDELA NAKBA DAY TOUR - MINNEAPOLIS. MAY 16

2023 marks the 75th anniversary of the Nakb ("Catastrophe" in English), when over 750,000 Palestinians were banished from their homes upon the formation of the settler-colonial state of Israel. Today, there are close to five million Palestinian refugees who continue to demand their Right to Return to the homes and lands from which they were exiled.

To commemorate the Nakba, the U.S. Palestinian Community Network (USPCN) and the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression (NAARPR) have arranged a brief U.S. Nakba Day 75 tour, to take place from May 15 - May 20, featuring Nkosi Zwelivelile Mandela, elected member of the South African National Assembly representing the African National Congress – and grandson of the late Nelson Mandela – as the tour's keynote speaker.
