

## Readings May 14, 2023

### Sixth Sunday of Easter

#### First Reading: Acts 17:22-31

<sup>22</sup>Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. <sup>23</sup>For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. <sup>24</sup>The God who made the world and everything in it, the one who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, <sup>25</sup>nor is God served by human hands, as though needing anything, since that very God gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. <sup>26</sup>From one ancestor God made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, <sup>27</sup>so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for and find God—though indeed God is not far from each one of us. <sup>28</sup>For 'In God we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said,

'For we too are the offspring of God.'

<sup>29</sup>"Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. <sup>30</sup>While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now God commands all people everywhere to repent, <sup>31</sup>because God has fixed a day on which to judge the world in righteousness by a man whom God has appointed, and of this God has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

## Psalm: Psalm 66:8-20

<sup>8</sup>Bless our <sup>l</sup> God, you peoples;  
let the sound of <sup>l</sup> praise be heard.

<sup>9</sup>**Our God has kept us a- <sup>l</sup> mong the living  
and has not allowed our <sup>l</sup> feet to slip. R**

<sup>10</sup>For you, O God, have <sup>l</sup> tested us;  
you have tried us just as sil- <sup>l</sup> ver is tried.

<sup>11</sup>**You brought us in- <sup>l</sup> to the net;  
you laid heavy burdens up- <sup>l</sup> on our backs.**

<sup>12</sup>You let people ride over our heads; we went through <sup>l</sup> fire and water,  
but you brought us out into a place <sup>l</sup> of refreshment.

<sup>13</sup>**I will enter your house <sup>l</sup> with burnt offerings  
and will pay <sup>l</sup> you my vows—**

<sup>14</sup>those that I promised <sup>l</sup> with my lips  
and spoke with my mouth when I <sup>l</sup> was in trouble.

<sup>15</sup>**I will offer you burnt offerings of fatlings with the <sup>l</sup> smoke of rams;  
I will give you ox- <sup>l</sup> en and goats. R**

<sup>16</sup>Come and listen, all you <sup>l</sup> who believe,  
and I will tell you what God has <sup>l</sup> done for me.

<sup>17</sup>**I called out to God <sup>l</sup> with my mouth,  
and praised the Lord <sup>l</sup> with my tongue.**

<sup>18</sup>If I had cherished evil <sup>l</sup> in my heart,  
the Lord would <sup>l</sup> not have heard me;

<sup>19</sup>**but in truth <sup>l</sup> God has heard me  
and has attended to the sound <sup>l</sup> of my prayer.**

<sup>20</sup>Blessed be God, who has not reject- <sup>l</sup> ed my prayer,  
nor withheld unfailing <sup>l</sup> love from me. **R**

## **Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:13-22**

<sup>13</sup>Who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? <sup>14</sup>But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, <sup>15</sup>but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; <sup>16</sup>yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. <sup>17</sup>For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. <sup>18</sup>For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. Christ was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, <sup>19</sup>in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, <sup>20</sup>who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. <sup>21</sup>And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, <sup>22</sup>who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

## **Gospel: John 14:15-21**

[Jesus said:] <sup>15</sup>"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. <sup>16</sup>And I will ask the Father, who will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. <sup>17</sup>This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, whom the world neither sees nor knows. You know the Spirit, because the Spirit abides with you, and will be in you.

<sup>18</sup>"I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. <sup>19</sup>In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. <sup>20</sup>On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. <sup>21</sup>They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."
