WEAVING OUR LIVES TOGETHER

During the pandemic when we were roommates, we would stream Holy Trinity's Sunday service with candles, our improvised communion kit, and weavings on our laps. When Pastor Ingrid and Phil invited us to take part in the congregational theme of weaving our lives together last fall with large community weavings, it was an honor and a welcome creative challenge. By saying yes, we (unknowingly) further wove ourselves into the beautiful fabric that is the Holy Trinity community. And this time, there would be candles, traditional communion, and the weavings would be way too big to put on our lap. And most importantly, we would weave with you all in the space with us.

Weaving has always been a meditative art form for us, a calming practice. This came in handy the first time we wove in front of the congregation during a service. We had never woven in front of so many people before! As we took yarn over and under the weft on the looms and let the liturgy and service settle our shaky hands, the hours flew by. It was a beautiful way to participate in worship. The conversations we were able to have with some of you before or after services were gifts in themselves: to meet you, to connect with you, to keep weaving us together.



Unlike many weaving styles and crafts, our weavings embrace the practice of emergence. We don't plan our designs in advance. This came in handy as we waited each week to find what treasures this community entrusted us to weave into the pieces. Every Monday evening, we came to the church to weave

and were delighted and moved by what we found left for us: a baby's mitten, photos of loved ones, a favorite recipe, key chains, a pride flag, jewelry, delicate paper cranes, shards of pottery, sand dollars, a miniscule giraffe figurine, and on and on.



Some items came with stories, some without, and we even wondered if some were placed there by accident (if you put a tube of lip gloss in the object collection basket, you'll find it nestled in a weaving!). Sometimes the offerings made us (continued on next page)

giggle. Other times, we were moved to tears as we tied in precious objects that symbolized community members' losses. Indeed, we will never forget weaving in the church on All Saints Day. The sun flooded the sanctuary, and white ribbons



fluttered long and luminous from the ceiling. To be there with you all and weave in pictures of loved ones past and the objects that they cherished — it was a moment of sacred communion.

This project was filled with uncertainty. We had never created weavings so large, we'd never woven in front of a whole congregation, and we'd certainly never woven objects of all shapes and sizes directly into our pieces. At first the task was daunting, much like the act of bringing our stories back together after long and painful separation. As we were, and are, coming back together we were clumsy and made mistakes. But we kept going and found more harmony and ease in the undertaking. Just as we keep going and intentionally share with each other as community and see our moments of joy and mundane and sadness as interconnecting, too. And that is our final hope for these pieces; that the details continue to give you pause and delight you, that you see the way your stories intertwine, overlap, and dance colorfully with each other. ~Mariah Wika and Ryana Holt
