REFLECTIONS ON FIRE BY NIGHT: FINDING GOD IN THE PAGES OF THE OT, CHS 1-3

Even Melissa Florer-Bixler's title drew me back to my own transformative encounters with the Old Testament, 40 years ago this fall. I had grown up in the church, child of faithful and active parents who shared their love of God and of Christian community very clearly. I had been taught all those Sunday School approved Old Testament stories, some even in hi-tech flannel board. And I had heard those little snippets of Old Testament every week in the First Lesson and the Psalm, always read but rarely preached, often sounding as if they came from a very different age of the world. I was still imagining scripture primarily as a set of instructions from God to us, sometimes told in story. As I started to think more deeply about the important issues of the time, I was searching for a framework that would let me lean into the good passages (like the prophets) as authoritative while dismissing the problematic ones (I'll bet you have your own list). I was looking for a hermeneutic that worked for me, a way of understanding how to read scripture and what authority to give it in my life. Florer-Bixler asks a similar question: How do we read these words written in a world so different from ours, stories that are both ruthless and filled with grace? (p.17)

I won't dwell on my story here. Suffice it to say that reading the Old Testament in class, as literature, with a mix of Christians, Jews, and folks who claimed no religious tradition at all, blew it wide open for me. At almost the same time, a chance encounter with Hasidism through Elie Wiesel's book "Souls on Fire" sealed the deal. So many new ideas: the power of leaning into historical and social context and location; the way we encounter truth in stories, both in the bible and other places; different ways of reading different kinds of material; religious communities (Hasidic Jews) finding God's presence and activity in the Hebrew Bible in places I would never have thought to look. I have been fascinated with the Old Testament ever since.

The first three chapters of "Fire by Night" make a powerful case for encountering God in the Old Testament. In many ways, the first chapter is about taking social location seriously. Who we are and what we are bringing with us matters. Who spoke and wrote these stories in the past matters. The history of how these stories have been used and abused matters. The story of the rabbis arguing over the clay oven illustrates *(continued on next page)*

beautifully both their intensity of engagement with scripture and with God and the ways in which scripture is released *"into the care and keeping of God's people."* (p.33)

In her second chapter, Florer-Bixler lifts out neighborliness as a fundamental theme of the Old Testament. I appreciate her lean into Leviticus, not a simple read, and the deep connection Leviticus makes between how faithfulness to God and God's commandments shows up in love of neighbor. By really paying attention to its context, she demonstrates the ways scripture is always adapting. *God's life works itself out within different people in every age, life springing up within us.* (p. 52)

Florer-Bixler calls chapter three, *God of Victims*. It's a powerful chapter, turning to the *pervasive evil that rips apart human communities* (p. 55). She spends much of her time in dialog with Genesis 19, the Sodom and Gomorrah story. While she names the painful ways this story has been misused through the centuries, in it she discovers *"a God who is with and for the most vulnerable of our world."* (p. 57) Throughout the chapter, she reminds us that although the contexts may be different from our own, in this story and others we find God showing up for the victims of systemic, institutional violence and oppression. Here sin is not an individual problem but is *"corporate and endemic"* (p. 69), and God's response is to challenge the whole community to open their eyes.

SATURDAY, JULY 22-METAMORPHOSIS: ANGELA TWO STARS

Metamorphosis: "a change of the form or nature of a thing or person into a completely different one, by natural or supernatural means." Metamorphosis is a participatory installation by artist, Angela Two Stars and in collaboration with Pangea World Theater, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, and Longfellow Rising. Metamorphosis acts as phase II of The Transition Stage (2021), a temporary community cocoon installation, which served as a vessel for community laments, hopes, dreams, and mottos of strength as the Longfellow neighborhood and the city of Minneapolis moved towards growth, redevelopment, and healing after the 2020 murder of George Floyd and subsequent uprisings that caused destruction and devastation to the Longfellow neighborhood.

Metamorphosis is a 2-sided mural. One side features the compilation of written community contributions, a reminder of the losses experienced after the uprisings of 2020 but also a reminder of the resilience and hope of the Longfellow neighborhood and how together, we can rebuild.

The other side of the artwork, a butterfly scene, the representation of the transformation, rebuilding, and strength of the community. Interactive chrysalis sculptural art forms will invite audience participation to enter and emerge from the discarded chrysalis "transformed," a metaphor of the rebuilt neighborhood. Community engagement activities held throughout the festival will invite the audience to create their own butterfly designs to add to the artwork. Location: Former MIGIZI site, 3017 27th Ave. S.


