REFLECTIONS ON *FIRE BY NIGHT*: CHAPTERS 10-11

HOLY TRINITY

Metaphor describes something by saying something else. It is not meant to be taken literally. "One metaphor for God in the Old Testament is fire.God as the fire lighting the way, ablaze in awe and fear, wonder and hope." Florer-Bixler's hope for us is that the stories of the OT "set us ablaze with God's love"(18).

One's social location and experiences bring different understandings. The title of chapter 10, "God of the Table," took me to Communion/God's Table, a table of hospitality extended to all. Even the scripture (Genesis 18:1-2), of Abraham inviting three strangers in for food, seemed to fit. Offering hospitality to strangers, immigrants, and others was a cultural norm in OT days. The author is a Mennonite pastor. Mennonites have no sacraments, they view Communion as a symbol or sign "by which the

church thankfully remembers the new covenant which Jesus established by his death" (<u>mennoniteusa.org/Article</u> 12).

We learn much from different perspectives. Florer-Bixler's chosen scripture led her to an icon by Rublev from the 15th century that is interpreted to be a presentation of the Trinity (God, Christ, Holy Spirit) in the persons of the three strangers. Sharing her perspective on the story of Abraham today, and looking for God's message for us, she reminds us that we will never entirely understand. We interpret as best we can, yet welcome mystery as well— what is beyond our knowing. We can learn more of God as Trinity in her telling. (Read all of Genesis 18). God's love is shown in the three strangers, and in the everyday offering of food. "You were put here in love to love because you are God's beloved," (161). Concluding Chapter 10, the author notes that it is the shared meal of communion that led her to see the story of Abraham's table and the strangers as representative of the Trinity.

Chapter 11, "God of Friendship," Florer-Bixler approached through the story of Naomi and Ruth (Ruth 1:22— read all of Ruth 1). When Naomi's husband and married sons die, she encourages her daughers-in-law to go back to their families. They were young and accustomed to the culture of Moab, their home. One elects to stay in Moab; the other, Ruth, chooses to go with Naomi to her people, in Judah. One settled


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for what was familiar for her; the other was open to change and growth. Love made a new family for Naomi and Ruth. Friendship grows outside of the familiar— allowing one to grow, to expand to new possibilities. The author sees in it the story of survival of women through time, from trauma through hope, with God's love and leading, to friendship, to new life. It was refreshing and encouraging to read through a woman's eyes. For too long we lacked the perspective of women regarding the stories in the Bible!

Florer-Bixler's metaphor of fire setting us ablaze with a passion for God and for the Word is apt. Read the Old Testament. It is the story of the lives of the Israelites from 1200-165 BC; their interpretation and understanding of God. We who grew up thinking the stories were only full of violence, destruction, and a judgmental, punitive God were wrong. Keep reading and you will see a God of love and faithfulness in the stories. We need the stories today. Why? Consider: from sling shots and giants (David and Goliath) to missiles and drones (Russia and Ukraine). Is it any different today? Think of 2023. The story of our time; see not just violence and destruction but God's love and faithfulness that endures forever.

One author, four readers writing their reflections. God's word continues to speak anew to us. Stories hold multiple meanings. We each hear with a different ear and heart and experience. What is God saying to you?

REMEMBER AND REFLECT: STREET ART BOARDS FROM THE GEORGE FLOYD UPRISING

Becketwood Cooperative will host a free outdoor exhibit of street art boards that were created during the uprising following the killing of George Floyd. Titled *Remember and Reflect: Plywood Art From the George Floyd Uprising*, the exhibit will take place on Saturday, August 5, from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the grounds of Becketwood, 4300 West River Parkway, Minneapolis.

The boards are provided by *Save the Boards Minneapolis* whose founder, Kenda Zellner-Smith, will give a presentation at 12:30 p.m.. *Save the Boards'* vision is to uplift local artists and serve as a safe space for community education, reflection, and storytelling, allowing viewers to connect with art through their own experiences, voices, and personal journeys. The band Brass Solidarity, which was founded in 2021 in response to the movement for Black lives, will also perform. This event is an initiative of Becketwood, a welcoming 55+ cooperative community located on 12 acres across from the Mississippi River.



THE PATH TO PEACE: MUSIC AGAINST GUN VIOLENCE *The Path to Peace: Music Against Gun Violence* is a choral program and community gathering initiative presented in partnership with Protect Minnesota, the only independent, state-based organization devoted to gun violence prevention in Minnesota.
