# AFRICAN PASTORS' FUND

Holy Trinity recently sent our annual gift via the African Pastors' Fund to support our partners in Bukoba, Tanzania. This year, the amount generated by the endowment fund was \$2,260. The post below was originally written in 2015 by Josiah and LuAnn Kibira, Joel and Nancy Wiberg, and Pastor Jay Carlson to share the origin story of the Fund. We thought it would be lovely to lift up this story again and share it with our community.

In 1998, Holy Trinity members Josiah and LuAnn Kibira spent a year in Josiah's hometown of Bukoba, Tanzania, as self-supporting volunteers for the ELCA. LuAnn worked as a nurse consultant at Ntoma Orphanage & Dispensary, while Josiah worked as an IT consultant at the diocese's central office. It was during this time that various retired pastors approached Josiah expressing the economic and financial hardships they were facing due to their low pensions. Josiah was approached partly because many of the pastors had known his father well when he was the bishop in the diocese. Josiah learned that some of the pastors had no income at all because when they retired they opted to take their pension as a lump sum. The amount was not large, however, and was quickly used up. For those who did not take lump sums, the monthly pensions averaged the equivalent of three dollars per month and were quite small compared to the high inflation rates that the whole country was facing. One pastor explained that the bus fare to get to the diocese central office to collect the pension was almost equal to the amount of the pension he was going to collect.

What was remarkable about these retired pastors is that even in retirement they were expected to work in their villages as well as within the diocese. They continued to lead worship, visit the sick, and officiate for weddings and funerals. While the diocese did provide medical care, the pastors did not receive any income.

Upon completing their service in Tanzania, Josiah and LuAnn were determined to find a way to help. Since Holy Trinity members had come to know Bukoba well through several congregational trips, the Kibiras turned to the congregation for help. The problem was shared with Joel Wiberg and Pastor Ronald Johnson, who had both lived and worked in Bukoba, and they suggested presenting the idea to the finance committee for further discussions. It was later accepted and an African Pastors' Fund was created to augment the income of retired pastors and widows of the

#### November 26 "Ethnographic Study" Amy Levad

In the days and weeks after George Floyd's murder, Levad volunteered at Holy Trinity. While she did a few things at the church, she spent most of her time and energy collecting donations from families, friends, and neighbors and dropping off items purchased from donations at the front of the church. Levad wants to express her gratitude to the Holy Trinity community for providing a way to contribute during those difficult days.

This project has been developed by Levad in conversation with Holy Trinity pastors and other Holy Trinity community members about the impacts of George Floyd's murder and the uprising on Holy Trinity, its members, leaders, volunteers, and the surrounding community. In those conversations, the need for a process of memory, discernment, and reflection within Holy Trinity and its connected



communities has surfaced. Levad is using her time during sabbatical in spring 2024 to help facilitate this process.

#### December 3 "Doughnut Economics, Basic Concepts" David Howe and Sean Morrell

The presentation is based on videos and a book by economist Kate Raworth. First are 4 main ideas of world economics in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. These ideas tell what the economy is, who is it for, who we are, and what success looks like. These ideas do not equip us for the reality and challenges ahead.

These ideas are contrasted with Raworth's sustainable Doughnut Economics for the  $21^{st}$  century.

Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania–Northwest Diocese. The fund was established in 2000.

At its inception, the goal was to raise about \$25,000 and create a fund to help out about 33 retired pastors and widows. Members of the congregation may continue to contribute to the fund. The annual growth (interest) is withdrawn and sent by Holy Trinity to the NW Diocese each November for safe and timely distribution to all eligible pastors and widows.

One pastor expressed something very personal to Josiah while he was volunteering in Tanzania. He said, "My financial situation is so bad that I do not have an offering for Christmas." This was a heavy testimony from a man whose life was dedicated to teaching others the importance of giving. But now he had nothing to give. This fund ensures that most pastors at least have something to sustain themselves over the holidays so that they can also be generous.

On average, each pastor or widow receives between \$35 to \$50 each November. It may seem small, but it is a significant amount in Bukoba, and pastors look forward to receiving it, especially at the end of the year when expenses tend to increase.

The retired pastors and widows continue to express gratitude to the members of Holy Trinity. They continue to appreciate Holy Trinity's partnership in helping them in their mission of spreading the Gospel even in their retirement. They continue to respond to God's call to serve, in part because of Holy Trinity's gift.

# **DEADLINE REMINDERS**

#### NOMINATE A SPECIAL APPEAL FOR 2024

Each year, Holy Trinity identifies and authorizes special financial appeals for 2-3 organizations. Special appeals are characterized by being open ended (i.e., we give to the organization(s) what we receive), they are normally approved for just one year, and they are supported by a special appeal letter which is sent to all the giving households in the congregation.

The Financial Stewardship Committee and Church Council work together to select the organizations. They evaluate proposed organizations based on the organization's relationship to or history with Holy Trinity; the connection between the organization and the goals of Holy Trinity; and the donation's impact. They seek to achieve a balance between local and global giving.

If you have a 501(c)3 organization that you'd like to nominate, please contact one of the church's standing committees and ask for support of your nomination. By tradition, the World Hunger of the ELCA has been included as one of the causes designated for a special appeal and therefore does not need to be submitted by a standing committee. Nominations will be accepted until December 1, 2023. The congregation will be informed of the 2024 special appeals at our annual meeting in January.
