Introduction

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? There we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." Romans 6:3-5

When we baptize a baby, child, or adult at Holy Trinity, we say aloud (for everyone to hear) that the one being washed in the grace-filled waters is a beloved child of God. Baptism doesn't make one beloved; it celebrates this fact and makes it public. Baptism also proclaims that the baptized is united with the community in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the world.

The journey begun in baptism continues through one's life. Nothing can erase the promises that are made when a simple bowl of water is poured and simple words are spoken. Regardless of what we have done and what we have left undone, the Holy Spirit is with us until the end, and God's promises remain certain.

When someone dies and we carry her or him on the final leg of the baptismal journey, we honor the holy promises that were made to this beloved individual by both God and the community. We also trust that because of Jesus, death does not have the final word. Theologian Thomas Long writes that "when we [lower] a casket into the gaping earth, [we acknowledge that] this [is] not the end of the journey nor the final word but that God [is] already speaking a new word, already performing beyond our sight and our full knowing another mighty work of hope" (*The Good Funeral*, 45).

It's difficult to remember these promises without the help of the community, which is why the church stops and gathers when one among us dies. In the Christian funeral and burial, undertaker Thomas Lynch says "we get the dead where they need to go and the living where they need to be" (*Ibid.*, xii). By attending to the dead with reverence all the way to the end, we believe that we also learn something about the life that we're given in Christ Jesus.

It's our prayer and our hope that this document helps you to have faithful conversations with your families, friends, and faith community about both life and death. May the church surround you with love as you do.

APPENDIX C-EXPENSES

<u>Pastor</u>

The pastors at Holy Trinity believe that presiding over the Rite of Christian Burial is included in their call to this congregation. While some families choose to give the presiding minister an honorarium, this is not necessary.

Musicians

Should someone wish to have a keyboardist (organist or pianist), soloist, and/or other special musician, s/he should plan to compensate them for their time. At the time of printing (April 2014), we suggest an honorarium between 150-200 dollars per musician.

Food and Drink

Holy Trinity provides coffee and sweet treats (cookies and bars) for all members' funerals and memorial services. Additionally, the church has a group of volunteers willing to serve a meal, should that follow either the service in the sanctuary or the graveside service. The cost of the meal will be the responsibility of the family or friends of the deceased.

Bulletins

Holy Trinity prepares and prints the worship bulletins at no cost. The funeral home may prepare a memorial folder that includes an obituary and a picture; the bulletin prepared by the church guides worshippers through the service liturgy.
