Invitation into Generosity: Soup for You and World Hunger

Dear members.

Individually and as a congregation, members of Holy Trinity enjoy many blessings and share those locally, nationally, and internationally. Each year we endorse special needs at our annual meeting that deepen our congregational life and reach out into a wider world that requires our attention. The two appeals proposed this spring underscore the reality that food scarcity, even starvation, remains a pervasive and persisting problem. We have an opportunity to address evident needs in our immediate community through a new collaboration that will make us one hub of food services. We also endorse the highly effective, ongoing work of our ELCA World Hunger Program that reaches across the nation and throughout the world.

KITCHEN REHABILITATION

Holy Trinity's basement kitchen is a well-designed but aging workhorse that has served us efficiently for decades. It hosts lunches at annual meetings, pancake breakfasts by our youth, events sponsored by the Minnesota Swahili Christian Congregation, Healthy Seniors assemblies, Bright Prospect parties, Metro Work Center celebrations, CTUL gatherings, and more.

The kitchen has been maintained over the years but requires refurbishment for even more intense and regular use. Bethany Lutheran Church, which has for years accommodated "Soup for You" (https://soupforyou.info/) in the Seward neighborhood, closed its doors. The community organizers who provide free lunches five days a week there have asked if we would house their operation at Holy Trinity. At our annual meeting you agreed.

Additional support is needed for us to deep clean equipment, integrate their equipment, upgrade plumbing and electrical, replace aging cupboards, and add new functionality. Preliminary estimates for this work price it at approximately 30,000 dollars. These funds will ensure that, beginning in May, we can fully support Soup for You. Their goal is to continue to feed, nourish, and comfort all that come through our doors with a hot meal, served restaurant style in a community setting. By bringing together people from all walks of life, Soup for You builds beloved community. Soup for You currently serves an average of 50 guests per day or 13,000 guests per year. Our goal is to provide a clean, safe,

HOLY WEEK 2024

Sunday, March 24—Palm Sunday

This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work. Worship services of Holy Communion at 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. begin with shouts of Hosanna! as we recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to disrupt powers of violence and oppression. Our 11:00 a.m. procession will begin outside near the Rain Garden.

Thursday, March 28—Maundy Thursday

All are welcome to gather for Dinner Church at 6:00 p.m., as we begin our observance of the Three Days. The meal and worship will be interwoven. The liturgy on this day contains the elements that define Christianity: the church announces that sins are forgiven; we approach one another and God in vulnerability through foot washing; money is collected for the care of the neighbor; and we share Holy Communion, the meal that celebrates the living presence of Jesus among us. Children's Choir will help lead music for the service.

Friday, March 29—Good Friday

The night's liturgy tells the story of Jesus' Passion. Tonight, we meet Jesus at the foot of the cross. As we grieve his death, we voice our lives' laments. Even in the sorrow of this day, we trust in the resurrection promises given to us. We leave tonight's service in silence. The service begins at 7:00 p.m. in the Bartsch Room. The Adult Choir will lead our singing, and Andrew Winfield will grace us with music on cello.

Saturday, March 30—Vigil of Easter

Gathered together in the womb of night, we retell the stories of our faith, celebrate Christ's resurrection, and are renewed in the gift of baptism. A small group ensemble and soloists will lead the Easter Vigil, which will begin in the Bartsch Room this year at 5:00 p.m. so that families with young children can participate!

Sunday, March 31—Easter Sunday

Christ is risen! Jesus is alive, and God has swallowed up death forever. With Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, we may feel astonished and confused, unsure of what to make of the empty tomb. But this is why we gather: to proclaim, witness, praise, and affirm the liberating reality of Christ's death and resurrection. In word and feast, we celebrate God's unending love, and depart to share this good news with all the world. Alleluia! We gather for festival worship services of Holy Communion at 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. to celebrate this good news. The adult choirs, along with brass ensemble, will help to lead worship. Christ is risen! Let us rejoice!

ELCA CONFERENCE OF BISHOPS CALLS FOR A PERMANENT BILATERAL CEASE-FIRE IN GAZA

The Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is adding its voice to the growing group of faith leaders urgently calling for a permanent bilateral cease-fire in Gaza. We urge President Joe Biden, our legislators, and all who lead and make decisions on behalf of the United States to do everything in their power to bring an end to the current suffering and lay the foundation for lasting peace with justice.

As members of the ELCA Conference of Bishops, we are elected to lead one of the largest Christian denominations in the United States, with nearly 3 million members in more than 8,700 worshiping communities across the 50 states and in the Caribbean region. We are compelled to advocate, pray, and act by the social teachings of our denomination and by our belief — rooted in Scripture — that all people are made in the image of God.

We mourn the loss of 1,200 precious lives in Israel on October 7 by the actions of Hamas and the trauma for those 250 others who were taken hostage. We mourn the loss of over 30,000 precious lives in Gaza — including tens of thousands of women and children — who have died in Israel's military action since then and the trauma that ripples outward from this loss. We grieve the deaths of more than 400 Palestinians in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, and in Israel since October 7 as the circle of violence expands and makes casualties of yet more civilians.

Too many have suffered. Too many lives have been lost. Strong U.S. leadership is needed to help bring a comprehensive permanent cease-fire and lasting peace. Our country's leadership is needed to support human rights and the Geneva Conventions, to resume funding to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA), and to provide greater access for humanitarian relief in Gaza, as well as to advocate for the immediate and safe return of the hostages and release of political prisoners, for affirmation of both Israel and Palestine's right to exist, and for a path forward that disrupts cycles of violence. Mindful of the rise in hate targeted at people across complex intersections of race, ethnicity, and religion — worldwide and nationally — we exhort our legislators, leaders, and neighbors to oppose hate in all its forms, and we recommit ourselves to partnership in that same work.

Jesus taught: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). We affirm that all our neighbors, near and far, are children of God and made in God's image, and we are praying for President Biden, our legislators, and all decision-makers. May God give us and our leaders everything necessary to meet the needs of this critical moment, particularly peacemaking.
