PASTOR DAVID'S IMMIGRATION STATUS

When I began my work among you in May of 2020, I worried that this congregation (although well-meaning), did not truly understand what it meant to accompany an under-documented immigrant staff person. By that point, the Churchwide expression of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and the Indiana-Kentucky Synodical expression of the ELCA had proven to me that they were incapable of accompanying me as an under-documented immigrant seminarian. I began my time with you all with many doubts about the future.

We have all lived many experiences as a community since May of 2020, and throughout these last four years you all have proven that you meant what you said when you invited me to be a staff person among you. This has been especially true during the month of August 2024. This is why I want to share my gratitude with you all, and give you all – my community – an update of joy.

Firstly, some of you may be aware that I fell out of legal immigrant status on August 2, 2024. It is important to say that this is due to the backlog of the U.S. immigration system. Holy Trinity as my employer (as well as the lawyers we are working with) turned in the necessary paperwork and paid the filing fees on time. This is an example of how the system needs humane reform.

When falling out of legal immigrant status, one is not allowed to legally work in the U.S. Important documents like real ID driver's licenses, employment authorization documents, and other proofs of legal residency are terminated. This affects access to healthcare, travel, and leisure. I experienced many days of frustration, anger, sadness, and shame.

To make matters worse, on Sunday August 11, our church office suite was broken into during the one worship service. The individual took my bag from my office because it had many of my personal and work electronics which are valuable. Unbeknownst to him however, it also carried my passport, original immigration paperwork, and other pieces that I had been in the process of scanning to send along to the lawyers. The burglary added a sense of violation, and created headaches of trying to regain all of my important paperwork.

On the evening of August 26, I received an update from United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) that my paperwork (most importantly to me my Employment Authorization Document) had been renewed! I was once again legally able to work, live, and play in the U.S. for the next two years. This is the joy I want you all to know!

During these 2 years, HTLC will accompany me in a process

that will move me into a different immigrant category which we hope will be more permanent. I want to reiterate that there is no pathway for me to "become legal" as some might suggest. We are hoping that we will be able to begin what will be a 10-15 year process towards U.S. citizenship. One step at a time, knowing that many things could change at any given moment. For the time being I have become re-energized to serve as your pastor, to champion immigrant rights, to work alongside people and organizations who are caring about the neighbor, and to work for a Minnesota that we can all call home. Thank you all for caring.

NOMINATE A SPECIAL APPEAL FOR 2025

Each year, Holy Trinity identifies and authorizes special financial appeals for 2-3 organizations or efforts. Special appeals are characterized by being open ended (i.e., we give to the organization(s) what we receive), they are normally approved for just one year, and they are supported by a special appeal letter which is sent to all the giving households in the congregation.

The Financial Stewardship Committee and Church Council work together to select the organizations. They evaluate proposed organizations based on the organization's relationship to or history with Holy Trinity; the connection between the organization and the goals of Holy Trinity; and the donation's impact. They seek to achieve a balance between local and global giving.

If you have a 501(c)3 organization that you'd like to nominate, please contact one of the church's standing committees and ask for support of your nomination. By tradition, the World Hunger of the ELCA has been included as one of the causes designated for a special appeal and therefore does not need to be submitted by a standing committee. Nominations will be accepted until November 11, 2024. Nominations, supported by a standing committee, may be emailed to Pastor Ingrid. The congregation will be informed of the 2025 special appeals at our annual meeting in January.
