A LESSON IN A STOVE AND A BOWL OF SOUP

It's always hard to believe how quickly a year can pass by. It was a year ago that I was sitting in the office between Christmas and New Years thinking about conversations the staff had been having about leaning into 2024 as the year we are back. Back from COVID, back from the uprising, back to in-person activities, back to hosting events, back to life, together! We wanted 2024 to be the year we could come together again, fully, as a congregation and a community. And boy, have we done that! It has felt good to have so much life and activity back in the building.

As part of the process, one of the things we decided to lean into in 2024 was committing to a new building partner, Soup For You! They approached us in late October of 2023 looking for a new home. Everyone agreed it was the right thing to do, and it aligned with our mission in all sorts of ways.

It was also this time last year that I was sitting in the office wondering how we were going to make this work. The kitchen was going to need a lot of updating, and what about that old stove. It would definitely need to be replaced, many of us were sure of it, that was going to be expensive. Thankfully the congregation approved the "kitchen rehab" special appeal and I stopped wondering; we all came together and made it work. Thanks to the amazing generosity of members, friends, and neighbors, we were able to welcome SFY! into our space in June. They fit so well into our mission and the body of this community that it feels like they've always been here.

Through the money raised from the special appeal, we have been able to professionally clean and paint the kitchen. We made some plumbing upgrades and built out a wall to hide the pipes and add electrical outlets. We replaced wooden cabinets and counters with commercial grade stainless steel counters, shelving and work surfaces. We added electrical outlets in the old "Julbord" room that now houses 2 refrigerators and 3 freezers. We updated outlets in the kitchen to be up to code and to be able to accommodate an additional commercial refrigerator. The cement pad above the old Julbord room and pantry was replaced to help fix the water leaking issue we had into those spaces. All equipment and appliances were professionally cleaned and assessed. It's amazing what a difference that made to the convection oven.

But what about that old stove? Many of us were so focused

on that stove and how bad it looked. It seemed to never be working quite right. We were sure we needed a new one, even before we knew SFY! was moving in. Well, as it turns out, it really just needed some TLC. The company that assessed it said it has good "bones," and they said they wouldn't replace it. The stove just needed a little work, and some cleaning. That stove had been overworked, underappreciated, and not taken care of as good as it should have been, so it was looking weathered and worn out. This is where the lesson comes in. In life we often get so focused on the way something, or someone looks, that we forget to see the real value. We are all a little broken, a little worn, a little tired, we just need a little love, a little care, a purpose. That old stove has a purpose again, it warms the soups and enables Chef Judah, John, and the other soup makers to create the nourishing soup that warms the bodies, souls, and hearts of those who walk through the doors. We are not looking for perfection, we are looking for purpose, sharing love, compassion, and respecting the value of people and things, even when they look a little weathered. This year, I have found a lesson in a stove and a bowl of soup, and I am grateful.

There has been no better way to come back to community life. Thank you to Soup For You! and all who have donated money, time, and resources to make this partnership successfully happen.


