Southwest MN Indigenous Sites Trip

LUTHERAN CHURCH

HOLY TRINITY

In the first week of April a group of 28 people (half from Holy Trinity and half from Edina Community Lutheran Church) had the privilege of visiting a number of sites in southwest MN with important cultural and spiritual significance to Indigenous communities. The trip helped us become more aware of the Indigenous/settler interface, both in Minnesota's history and today. The sites included:

<u>Makoce Ikikcupi's Hohwoju Otunwe (Village of Vibrant</u> <u>Growth</u>), the second village of Makoce Ikikcupi (Land Recovery), in Mountain Lake: Visited with Luke Black Elk, governing council member and site manager, and John Stoesz, MN Repair Communities (<u>https://riseandrepair.org/</u>), about the work to restore production of native foods and build a Dakota earth lodge.



<u>Jeffers Petroglyphs</u>: About 5,000 rock carvings (7,000 years old) are preserved in this place (has been referred to as an encyclopedia of Native culture and spirituality).

<u>Pipestone National Monument</u>: For over 3,000 years, Indigenous people have quarried the red stone at this sacred site to make pipes used in prayer and ceremonies.

<u>Blue Mounds State Park</u>: Viewed prairie remnants, walked by Sioux quartzite cliffs, and saw a bison herd in the distance.

PARISH INFORMATION

<u>Lower Sioux Agency</u>, near Morton: Had several hours of conversation with John Robertson, site-based manager and member of Lower Sioux Community, who gave a guided tour of the history exhibit.

<u>Birch Coulee Battlefield</u>: The site of one of the deadliest battles of the US-Dakota War in 1862.



Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, Redwood Falls: Following soup supper and Lenten service, had conversation with Pastor Bryant Kaden and Shannon Wachter, Early Education teacher (and wife of Pastor Kaden). They are faithful models of cultural humility, building/nurturing relationships with Native neighbors, and striving to live as allies with Indigenous friends.

<u>Reconciliation Park, Mankato</u>: Dedicated in 1997 to promote healing between Dakota and non-Dakota peoples. The park sits near the infamous site of the 1862 hanging of 38 Dakota men.

<u>Traverse des Sioux</u> and <u>Treaty Site History Center</u>, St. Peter: Watched a movie and had a guided tour of the Center, which tells the stories of the Dakota people, explorers, traders, and settlers who played a pivotal role in shaping this area. Also walked a trail telling the history of the signing of the Treaty of Traverse des Sioux between the US government and the Dakota.
