HOLY TRINITY

I was looking for a photo on my phone the other day and unknowingly scrolled my way into May 2020. On May 27, I found a picture in the garden of our oldest kiddo—just two years old at the time—squinting in the sunlight, looking content. She had a black eye; I can't remember why. That was COVID time (and, for me, pregnancy time), when memory was strained.

The next picture, also from May 27, is of the Community Room being set up as a medic station. Then: the doors propped open. Then: huge fires. Then: neighbors arriving with food and basic necessities. Each image was a snapshot of community trying to find its voice and its power, in the wake of George Floyd's brutal murder by Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin. There was so much righteous anger filling both hearts and streets.

To be honest, it's hard to return to those images. Yes, neighbors showed up for each other. Yes, community rose from the ashes. Yes, beauty found its way to our doorstep in the midst of chaos. But beneath all of that was the brutality we witnessed with our own eyes.

Theologian Kelly Brown Douglas says that American culture rooted in systemic oppression—assumes scarcity. That sense of scarcity feeds brutality. Experiences like the Uprising, she writes, are a kairos moments—ruptures in time with the potential to reshape what's possible. Will we choose freedom over control? Will we invest in relationship over security? Will liberation be the privilege of a few, or will it truly be for all? Will scarcity or abundance be our song?

Now, five years after George Floyd's murder and the Uprising that followed, Holy Trinity finds itself at another critical moment. The trauma of those days still lingers in the landscape, in our neighbors, in our own bodies. Trauma can stop us in our tracks or it can be a catalyst. Theologian Parker Palmer writes that "the heart can break in two ways: it can break apart into a thousand shards and be scattered across a landscape of despair, or it can break open into greater capacity to hold the complexities and pain of the world." I hope our collective life these past five years reflects a church choosing to break open—to lean into pain, to listen deeply, to move with courage—for the sake of the neighbor. As we follow the gospel's evolving call in this place, we live in the paradox—trauma and resilience, devastation and strength, lament and celebration. We must lean into these tensions, not try to resolve them. In keeping with our Lutheran theology, we trust that paradox is not a problem to solve but a holy tension to live within. These truths don't cancel each other out. Held together, they reveal a deeper reality. A more honest one. One where God is still showing up, still creating, still calling us into new life.

This Sunday, we'll speak a litany written by theologian Cole Arthur Riley for the five-year anniversary of George Floyd's murder. It ends with the words, *"Revive our hunger for beauty, tenderness, and steadied breathing. Keep the air in our lungs in pace with yours, knowing that, in you, justice is not far from us; no protest futile, no face forgotten."*

The 2025 theme, "The People Have Spoken," emphasizes the power of collective action and remembrance.


THURSDAY, MAY 29–LONGFELLOW ALTERNATIVE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION CEREMONY
