ACTIONS THAT CALL FOR ACTION

I returned to work on Tuesday after a week of vacation (which was lovely). By 11:30 a.m., my colleague Pastor David Larson-Martínez messaged me: armored vehicles and federal agents were stationed at Lake and Bloomington—one of our community's most gorgeous, immigrant-rich intersections.

I decided to head straight there, even though it meant missing an important anniversary celebration for one of our beloved building partners. When I arrived, I was stunned by the overwhelming militarization: ICE, FBI, DHS, HSI, ATF—all present. Masked agents offered no information to those gathered on the street.

Soon, Hennepin County Sheriffs and Minneapolis Police joined the scene. They said they were there "to keep people safe." But that's when I was violently thrown down by a sheriff when my back was turned. It was my first time being physically assaulted in clerics.

This scene wasn't the Lake Street I know and love. It was a full-blown military operation—armored trucks, machine guns, chemical irritants, and chaos unleashed in a neighborhood that deserves dignity, not domination.

We can tell ourselves that men in masks, tactical gear, and AK-40-whatevers storming local businesses in unmarked vehicles is normal. Or we can refuse that narrative. We can insist that our community deserves better. That our collective dream of safety and liberation is not only possible, but essential. And it demands more than what we witnessed on our streets yesterday.

I am a farm kid who now serves in the beautiful heart of a city. I'm not opposed to community safety; I'm simply opposed to the idea that with alarming regularity, my neighbors and I are forced to come face to face with weapons of war on our city streets. There is a better way, and I would expect that our city, county, and federal leaders would agree.

My clergy friend, Pastor Hierald Orsoto says that "even in the face of fear, there is power in community that flows from the very heart of God." I hear that heartbeat everyday on Lake Street, and trust that, even in the midst of suffering, God is leading us toward justice—not through domination or fear, but through the deep, courageous love we embody when we show up for one another.

Beloveds,

On Tuesday afternoon, heavily armed officers from a number of federal law enforcement agencies including Homeland Security, the FBI, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement <u>assembled</u> <u>for an operation</u> at Lake Street and Bloomington Avenue. This experience ignited fear and anger in a community already heightened in a political climate awash in xenophobia and bigotry. It is emblematic of federal policy and practice that increasingly employs fear as a tactic for achieving its aims. This action was irresponsible and traumatic for neighbors in South Minneapolis and across the metro.

We are grateful for the witness and presence of a number of clergy from nearby ELCA congregations who showed up powerfully during this action and response. We stand with these leaders in the demand that our local law enforcement abide by Minneapolis' separation ordinance (limiting Minneapolis Police Department's cooperation with federal immigration enforcement, prioritizing public safety and the well-being of all residents, including undocumented immigrants), and for an end to fear mongering and terror on the part of federal agencies. I am asking you to consider how you and your own congregation can prayerfully prepare to stand alongside your neighbors should actions like the one on Tuesday take place in your community, and how you can support the congregations in our Synod who acutely feel the weight of these tactics.

As followers of Jesus, himself the victim of state violence and terror, we know that we have a responsibility to stand alongside our neighbors, to reject fear and violence, and to seek God's justice in the places where we have been called. We know that the South Minneapolis community is resilient and that this action will not diminish or impede the love and solidarity among neighbors.

Please pray for those congregations in our Synod who were impacted by this action, and for those that serve immigrant communities. Consider ways that you and your congregation can show up meaningfully in solidarity with your presence and your financial gifts.

On Sunday, we celebrate Pentecost, the inbreaking of the Holy Spirit among a community experiencing fear and confusion. This encounter with the Holy sparked a movement of love, justice, and mercy that still animates our action today. In the face of the fear and confusion of our age, may we too trust in the rush of the Holy Spirit and the saving love of Jesus. May we remember that we are Church Together and each discern our own part in resisting fear and amplifying love for the sake of our neighbor.
