Soup For You! celebrates One Year at Holy Trinity!

Soup For You! Celebrated one year at Holy Trinity last Tuesday, June 3. Unfortunately that celebration was overshadowed by the events happening at Lake Street and Bloomington that day. What those events couldn't overshadow is the love, respect, and community that was happening in our space. We didn't know it at the time, but as Chef Judah was speaking to the group having soup, sharing stories about all the good that was happening within the walls of Holy Trinity, Pastor Ingrid was standing in the rain with Pastor David and other community members confronting the Minneapolis Police Chief about broken promises. I can't help but think about the juxtaposition of these two events and when I think about that, I am reminded of what one act can do and the ripple affect it can have. By now, most of us know Pastor Ingrid's words captured that day have rippled across the country, inviting compassion into the conversation. It started with one act.



Ten years ago, Chef Judah started with one act, his desire to feed the hungry. His vision was to create a space where people were not only fed, they were treated with dignity, respect, kindness, and above all love. He, along with others have created that with Soup For You! and that has rippled into the community inviting compassion into the conversation.

One year at Holy Trinity is only one tenth of the time Soup For You! has been in operation, but the impact made in that year has been immense. Over 20,000 bowls of soup have been served, 5,000 bags of groceries have been dispersed, 100s of pounds of clothes have been given away, more than that, community has been created. The staff and congregation of Holy Trinity gave Soup For You! a place to land, a place to call home, but SFY! has given this neighborhood a place to find community, compassion, and love.

As we celebrate the first year of our partnership with Soup For You!, I am hopeful. Hopeful that as a community we can continue to act, creating spaces where all feel welcome, feel a sense of belonging, find a place to land. I am grateful for the day we said yes to SFY! becoming a building partner, grateful for the work they do, the work we do together. May we continue this journey together for many years to some.

THURSDAY, JUNE 19–JUNETEENTH

Juneteenth is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Deriving its name from combining "June" and "nineteenth," it is celebrated on the anniversary of the order, issued by Major General Gordon Granger on June 19, 1865, proclaiming freedom for slaves in Texas. Originating in Galveston, Juneteenth has since been observed annually in various parts of the United States, often broadly celebrating African American culture. The day was first recognized as a federal holiday in 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law after the efforts of Lula Briggs Galloway, Opal Lee, and others. In 2022, the Personnel Committee and Church Council named Juneteenth a church holiday. The church office is closed so that pastors and staff can spend time with their friends and families and participate in community events. We'll be back in the office on Friday.

Join us for the Soul of the Southside Juneteenth Festival, a powerful celebration of Black freedom, creativity, and community. Held at the vibrant intersection of Minnehaha Avenue and East Lake Street in South Minneapolis, this free, all-ages event transforms the neighborhood into a living tribute to the resilience and brilliance of Black culture.


Now in its third year, Soul of the Southside began in 2022 as a celebration of the grand opening of The Legacy Building—founded by local hip-hop duo <u>iLLism</u> and one of the few Blackled creative spaces in Minnesota. Originally envisioned as a one-time event, the festival has grown into South Minneapolis's largest Juneteenth celebration, driven by overwhelming community support and a shared commitment to liberation through creativity.

This year's theme, "FAMILY: A REVOLUTIONARY FORCE," uplifts the power, resilience, and legacy of Black families biological and chosen—as the foundation of our communities and our future. Through live music, art exhibitions, storytelling, wellness activities, a Black-owned business market, and more, we honor the revolutionary spirit of Black family bonds—past, present, and future. Festival highlights include:

- Programming at iconic venues like The Hook and Ladder Theater, Moon Palace Books, Arbeiter Brewing, and The Historic Coliseum Building
- Family-friendly activities and a dynamic kids' zone
- Delicious food from local Black-owned vendors
- A robust lineup of performances and speakers celebrating the "Black Renaissance"

We commemorate June 19, 1865, when the last enslaved Black Americans in Galveston, Texas, were informed of their freedom—more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation. This date marks a pivotal moment in American history, and our festival is a space to remember, reflect, and rejoice.

Come celebrate with us from 12:00-8:00 p.m. and be part of a vibrant, welcoming community committed to honoring Black history, nurturing Black futures, and building a more inclusive world—together. This year, Holy Trinity has been asked by the organizers to serve as a safe gathering place for the festival, if needed.
