# Pride, What Does It Means, What Does It Look Like?

I recently logged into legal zoom for the first time in, well, 13 years, to be exact. I was caught off guard by the last document that had been done. It was the health care directive and power of attorney signed while I was pregnant with Francis. Eileen and I weren't legally married. We were married, but our legal right had not been established in Minnesota. That wouldn't happen for another year. If Eileen and I had been legally married, we would not have needed the documentation proving she could make choices for me. When Francis was born on September 9, 2012, the birth certificate only allowed for heterosexual parents. Obviously, I could not put a father down. But, I also, could not put another mother down. It was just me. I felt unexpected grief about that. I knew that we would need to do a second parent adoption, but it felt so terrible in that moment. This moment of celebration and yet the relationship that led to choosing to have a baby could not be honored in any sort of legal way. It did not feel like Pride.

Pride means I don't wonder if when I tell a colleague that my kids have two moms and a step mom, if it is safe to do so. Pride is not worrying that my kids will hear that their family has no value. Pride is knowing that the experience of being a rainbow family is valued in the communities I engage in. Pride is not worrying each and every time I tell someone that I am queer.

Pride looks like the weird little world I came of age in. As a kid, even in NW Minnesota, I was surrounded by hippies and people who just didn't really seem to care about sexual orientation. I flunked out of church summer camp. It was a pretty terrible experience. I got a scholarship at age 9 to go to Concordia Language Villages for camp. They didn't have as many language choices in 1990. From the ones available, I chose French. I was a villager for 8 years. And during high school and college, I worked my way up from kitchen helper to Head Cook of the French Village. French camp, even in the '90s, was fairly free flowing, a variety of gender expressions, and no assumptions about who you liked. I never really knew a world where it might not be okay to be queer. I suppose that is the joy of being young, naive, and spending a bit too much time in an idyllic setting.

I wonder if, that little world, where you could dress how you wanted, kiss (obviously this was when I was on staff) who you wanted, and explore a different culture, is really what
