### CONFIRMATION SUMMER TRIP

LUTHERAN CHURCH

HOLY TRINITY

It is only a few days since we returned from our Confirmation Summer Trip to Chicago, and my heart is swimming in memories of our time there. These trips are part of our curriculum which seeks to have our confirmands experience how people of faith put their beliefs into action. It is our hope that this allows students to stretch their travel wings, learn about what other people of faith are doing, and figure out how they want to live out their own faith journeys.

This year, our service experience trip was impacted by what is happening in the world around us. Initially, we were going to be leaning into a food and goods distribution site which serves underrepresented communities. However, in the last few weeks, this specific part of Chicago has experienced Immigration and Customs Enforcement ICE raids, and the community being served is living in fear. The organization is still meeting the needs of these folks, but the necessary shift meant that many people are simply not showing up in person. The aid is now being driven to homes and/or other safe(r) locations.

Our confirmands were able to experience a learning trip interspersed with some service components. The youth and chaperones have all mentioned that it was still a deeply meaningful experience, and I completely agree with them.

We took the Amtrak train from Saint Paul to Chicago, and we all were able to enjoy the train experience which got us to our hostel without delay. On Monday, our students had one of their two free days in Chicago, and we enjoyed a long boat tour along the Chicago River. On the tour we learned about the city's architecture and history. We then needed to make sure that we all had the groceries that we would need for the week, had really gotten settled into our hostel, and could set up some trip expectations for everyone.

On Tuesday we met at a historically Black congregation (First Immanuel Lutheran Church) and had the opportunity to learn from their elders who had lived in Chicago since the 1960s. This was after a morning spent learning at the DuSable Black History Museum and Education Center. Through these experiences our youth were able to grapple with the Black church's role in the Black liberation movement, and then meet folks in person who had lived through social upheaval. It was especially poignant to have our youth understand their own memories of the Minneapolis Uprising of 2020 with what the elders of the congregation's own experiences of the Watt's Riots in 1965. When you see our youth, I invite you to ask them about this!

She then stopped, took a deep breath, and proclaimed how grateful she was for the life she had lived and those she shared it with. She said it was important for her to spend whatever time left thanking people for being her friend, for being kind to her, and sharing in her journey. Thank you, Carol for accepting and loving me in all my messiness. What a blessing she was to so many and what a lesson in that moment; it was filled with love, learning, and gratitude.

Our youth learned about the folks who have called this area their home by spending mornings at the National Museum of Puerto Rican Arts and Culture as well as the Trans Chicago Empowerment Center. It was impactful to learn about the role that the Church has had in being a source of goodness as well as a source of pain for the majority Lation/a/e community. During this time, we were also able to help with some service projects at the historically Puerto Rican congregation (Trinidad Lutheran Church) led by the Reverend Eddie Rosas Fuentes. The confirmands did a fantastic job of engaging difficult conversations about the Christian faith. I invite you to ask them about it!

Of course, we did have a lot of fun too! In the evenings we had the opportunity to try Chicago style deep dish pizza, go to the SkyDeck at the Sears Tower, watch a live play at the Shakespeare Theatre on Navy Pier, walk along Michigan Avenue, explore the Chicago Riverwalk, visit the historically Mexican neighborhood of Pilsen, and see all the sites.

It is thanks to your love, prayer, and giving that we are able to have our youth travel on these trips. I encourage you to continue supporting this vital ministry!
