+CONFESSION

The ELCA social statement Faith, Sexism, and Justice: A Call to Action (2019) called for the development of accompanying worship resources. Pastor Ingrid was commissioned to write this confession and forgiveness for the Churchwide Assembly, which was held last month.

Eternal Life-Bearer, we confess our complicity in a world not of your making. While you envision communities built of mutuality, wonder, and neighbor justice, we are entangled in the sins of patriarchy. For generations, systems of oppression have harmed individuals and stunted our ability to imagine abundant life for all.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

Lover of the World, we acknowledge that sexism has shaped every corner of our lives. In our homes, schools, workplaces, townships, neighborhoods, and churches, women and girls have been silenced and sidelined, which is an affront to your divine goodness. We bring before you the cries of every age, trusting you to bear the pains we name and the suffering known only to you.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

Source of All, gender is not a monolith; it is vast, diverse, and beautifully infinite. We repent of the ways that women of color, women in same-gender relationships, trans women, and non-binary people have been subject to particularly virulent forms of discrimination and violence. We grieve that your sacred compassion has been corrupted by humanity's want to harass, dominate, and control.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

Mighty Deliverer, your vision is stronger than the fault lines of oppression that humanity has drawn. Your good and gracious news is for all regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, class, citizenship, marital status, age, education, ability, or any other distinction that has been weaponized and used to divide. Give us moral courage to interrupt acts that do not serve the common good and to dismantle the systems that harm.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

Creative Spirit, inequity is woven into the very fabric of our denomination. We lament the patriarchal language that dominates our sanctuaries, the gendered biases that persist in call processes and pay scales, and the stained-glass ceiling that often keeps female-identifying clergy from senior leadership. Inspire your church to treasure the expansive images made available to us in scripture and through the fullness of our lived experiences. Compel us to uplift those who have been subjugated.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

God Who Calls, you invite us into The Way—a way built neither on pride nor on shame but on creation's interconnected flourishing. Unearth in your church a bold pursuit to make space for women and girls—their giftedness, their voices, their bodies, their choices, their dreams. For we know that you are always at work beside us renewing, repairing, and closing the gap between the world as it is and the world as it ought to be.

Forgive us, transform us, and make us whole.

Dear ones, sinners and saints, hear the good news: patriarchy, misogyny, sexism, homophobia, and white supremacy are not written on your hearts; instead, God ensures that love, grace, forgiveness, justice, and abundant life are imprinted there forever. 
+GOSPEL READING


