Greetings, Holy Trinity!



From our perspective, the project has exceeded our stated hopes in the areas of accessibility, hospitality, and safety. Thank you for making a dream become reality!

As the jackhammers came to a rest, Pastor Jay Carlson announced his resignation and members of our congregational Transition Team (Cathy Alpizar, Josh Becker, Pastor Mark Holman, Sara Jensen, Tom Kleven, Theresa Rian, and Deb Sodt) began taking important initial steps in the process for our congregation's calling a new Lead Pastor. This team's major task this summer is preparing the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's Ministry Site Profile (MSP), a document that articulates our congregation's history, identity, mission, values, and goals. Further, the MSP will identify the personal characteristics, skills, experiences, and passions we value in a Lead Pastor.

Over the next several weeks, the Transition Team will offer opportunities for all members to be involved in the preparation of this document. Please watch the bulletin and Community Church for announcements about the Community Room 'Wisdom Box' and the 'Fellowship Tables' designed for that purpose. And please pray for members of the Transition Team as they, along with the Church Council, provide leadership in the Spirit-led process of discernment and planning.

Sunday, May 14—Adult Forum with Ron Duty on the Doctrine of Discovery

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly acted to repudiate the "doctrine of discovery" in 2016 and called upon its national staff and upon synods to educate members about its harmful effects on Native Americans. What is the doctrine of discovery and why does it matter? Where did the doctrine come from? This session of the forum will take a brief look at these questions.

Sunday, May 21—Adult Forum with the Wellstone House LVC Volunteers

Come and hear from this year's Wellstone House Lutheran Volunteer Corps (LVC) volunteers. LVC is a faith-based, full-time service and leadership program operating in 13 cities across the United States. LVC's mission is to unite people to work for peace with justice. They do this by placing volunteers in full-time positions at social justice organizations for one year.

LVC volunteers come from a wide variety of faith backgrounds, and do not need to be Lutheran. All volunteers live together in community and practice simple and sustainable living. LVC volunteers receive a modest stipend which covers housing, food, transportation, health insurance, and personal expenses.

This is a transformational program, one with which we at Holy Trinity are glad to be partnered. Come and hear an update from the volunteers living at the Wellstone House and serving in various settings around the city:

- *Laura Proescholdt is from Cumberland, WI, and has been serving at Minnesota Housing Partnership, which convenes, guides, and supports a diversity of partners working to improve conditions of home and community, especially for people at the lowest income levels.*
- *Kasi Misseldine is from Decorah, IA, and has been serving as the Outreach Coordinator at Trinity Lutheran Congregation in the Cedar-Riverside Neighborhood of Minneapolis. Trinity says that after 140 years, they are really good at change. They seek to embrace radical hospitality in a multicultural faith community.*
- *Connor Phelan is from a suburb of Chicago, IL, and has been serving at Minneapolis Bicycle Coalition, an organization that inspires people to bicycle and advocates for a city where everyone feels comfortable riding.*
- *Isabella Alsobrook is from Los Angeles, CA, and has been serving at Lutheran Social Service Refugee Services, forming relationships with refugee clients being resettled in Minneapolis.*
- *And last but not least, Maryl Fennie is from La Crosse, WI, and has been serving at Immigrant Law Center of Minnesota, an agency that provides legal assistance to low-income immigrants and refugees in Minnesota.*

Ramadan is the name of the ninth month in the Islamic lunar calendar. It is an important month in the Islamic calendar and culture. Each day during the month of Ramadan, many Muslims around the world observe the sacred month by fasting during daylight hours, offering nightly prayers in addition to their daily prayers, and concluding each day's fast with food, family, and friends. At the end of the month is a three-day holiday called Eid al-Fitr, which prepares individuals to return to their regular daily routine.

Sunday, May 28—Adult Forum with Rick Steves

Five hundred years ago, Martin Luther kicked off the Reformation, which ultimately split western European Christianity in two: Catholic and Protestant. In this one-hour public television special—filmed on location in Germany and Rome—Rick Steves traces the dramatic events of this grassroots movement that changed the course of history. Join us for the showing of this video, as we think about what it means to be a reforming church.

We'll view this video as Pastor Ingrid travels in Germany with Bishop Ann Svennungsen. The Lutheran Church of Leipzig has invited them to be their guests for Germany's premier celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. People from all over the world—as many as 300,000—will gather for Worship and Festivities in Wittenberg, Germany, on May 28. In addition, Leipzig will host them for its regional Reformation celebrations from May 24-27.

Friday, June 2—Parents' Night Out



The Oregon law, known as the Death with Dignity Act, has been in place for twenty years. We expect end of life options to become a public issue in Minnesota in the coming months and years. Conversations toward a Social Statement

A study from the ELCA Task Force on Women and Justice: One in Christ

Sunday, June 11—Adult Forum on “Faith, Sexism, and Justice” with Pastor Ingrid

In 2009, the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (our denomination!) authorized a social statement process “on the topic of justice for women in church and society.” Over the course of this summer, we’ll engage this conversation as a congregation. It is clear that countless people are suffering under the weight of injustice. Many individuals and families—both inside and outside of the church—are struggling because of the effects of sexism and patriarchy. These forces are personal, religious, social, and economic. All members are welcome to attend Sunday’s forum in which Pastor Ingrid will introduce this summer’s series of adult forums.

Wednesday, July 12—Loaves and Fishes


