TRANSITION

For just over a month now, I've had the privilege of serving as Interim Pastor of Holy Trinity. Nearly 7 months ago, you entered into a time of transition when you said good-bye to Pastor Jay, and just a couple weeks ago Pastor Ingrid began her maternity leave (for the purpose of welcoming Solveig Evelyn into the world!). I'm coming in somewhere past the halfway point.

There are two purposes of intentional interim ministry. The first is to simply step in and do what pastors do. In the case of Holy Trinity, that is to preach, plan worship, provide pastoral care, and participate in a variety of administrative tasks, including working with staff, Church Council, and committees.

The second purpose is to provide leadership related to the transition, in preparation of calling the next pastoral leader to serve among you. This involves working with the Transition Team and helping the congregation to be clear about its identity, as well as its strengths and particular challenges.

At Holy Trinity, this "in between time" is well underway. The Transition Team has finished its work and the congregation will elect a Call Committee on September 24.

I've known of and appreciated the mission and ministry of Holy Trinity for many years. And now what I see up close has confirmed my long held opinions of this place. A few observations:

- Holy Trinity listens to its neighborhood. Your recent work in the area of pay day lending, and the formation of Exodus Lending, is just one example of how you partner with God and others in the neighborhood. I look forward to seeing what comes next.
- You have a healthy understanding of the relationship between lay leadership and staff. Because you are a congregation with an extraordinary number of strong leaders, this is something that needs to be clarified on a regular basis. I've always believed that strong staff and strong lay leadership go together. Holy Trinity is a living example of this. You are a healthy congregation.
- Worship is the center of your life together. It is done with excellence and wide participation.
- You are willing to take risks. I am particularly impressed by your current commitment to racial justice. It is one thing to engage in this work on an intellectual or theoretical level; it is another to engage personally (e.g., the Intercultural Development Inventory and Listening).

Of course, there's more. This is a good place. I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve among you for awhile. I'd love to grab a coffee and learn more about you.

Thanks for all the ways that you invest in our life together and mission.

SEPTEMBER 17 "Holy Trinity's Initiative in Pursuit of Racial Justice" Randy Nelson, Holy Trinity Member

Earlier this year Randy Nelson did a study of Holy Trinity's efforts to address racial injustice by identifying the activities that have been involved in that effort and by interviewing members of the congregation who have been involved in that work. The result is a case study identifying what has been accomplished and goals still to be achieved. The forum will provide a detailed look at that initiative.
