# SERMON FROM JANUARY 7, 2018

Of all the Gospel-writers, Mark is the least likely to take the "scenic route" anywhere. He tells the story with swiftness and decisiveness, moving from point A to point B, wasting no time. He loves the word, "immediately"—it appears 28 times in the Gospel. Words and images are chosen with a particular purpose in mind. When Jesus comes out of the water, he sees the heavens "torn apart." The same word for "torn apart"—schizo—is used by Mark at the end of story, at the crucifixion, when the temple curtain is torn in two.

Here, before the sweet little dove came down, before the voice spoke from the sky,... the heavens were "torn apart." It doesn't say, "A dove suddenly appeared out of nowhere, and came floating gently down upon the head of Jesus." No, the heavens were torn apart, ripped, fractured... abruptly, purposefully, dramatically. Disruptive!

Mark wants us to know that God was determined to enter creation, and that God would disrupt in order to claim Jesus as God's beloved. God tears open the heavens because God can no longer stay away. In Luke, Jesus first appears as a sweet baby. Here, Jesus appears and the first thing that happens is the heavens are ripped apart!

In the very beginning of Genesis, the Spirit (or wind) of God is present. It is the same Spirit that is present here at Jesus' baptism. It is the same Spirit that is present in our baptism. In Genesis, God's work is to bring order out of chaos, beginning with the division of day and night, light and darkness. Indeed, the entire creation story is to bring order—the stuff and the creatures God makes are meant to work in harmony. But sometimes they don't work, and so God disrupts.

We live in a time of national disruption. Not all disruption is of God. Some disruption creates fear and leads to uncertainty about the future. The response to this kind of disruption just might be a counter-disruption—a peaceful, powerful disruption of resistance—that restores decency, kindness, humility, compassion, and justice as common values.

Jesus' baptism is disruptive. God rips open the heavens to claim Jesus (there is a promise), the Spirit shows up, and then right away, the Spirit sends Jesus into the wilderness, where for forty days, he faces all kinds of temptation and discernment about his identity.

In spite of its appearance, there is disruption in our baptisms, too. The first part of baptism is death and drowning, and letting go of what is past. But then Baptism becomes beautiful and precious. Baptism signifies that we are forever connected to God who calls us and knows us by name, just as this same God called Jesus by name. But more specifically, this One called Jesus and calls us by the only name that matters: "Beloved."

Our beautiful baptisms set us up for lives that are both challenging and joyful, that contain both dying and rising, order and disruption. Baptism is once, but the dying and rising happens every day as we are reminded by the presence of that same Spirit that when our lives are chaotic and hard and sometimes even unmanageable, that we wholly and completely belong to God, in Christ Jesus. The promise of grace, love, forgiveness, and acceptance is the disruption we need, over and over again.

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just the clergy but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to the story of the vision of Jacob, who called the place of his vision "the house of God, and...the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.
