Church Council (Pastor Ingrid and Pastor Angela): Elected members of Council have responsibility for the administration and mission leadership of the congregation. Visitors are welcome to observe Council meetings, which begin at 7:00 p.m.

Property (Vicki Mann and Nolan Gusdal): Maintenance and improvements for the building and grounds, work days.

Outreach (Meghan Olsen Biebighauser): Music in the Garden, Longfellow Alternative High School, Fare For All, intercultural development and racial justice, Minnesota Swahili Christian Congregation partnership, Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Open Streets, Longfellow Corn Feed.

WEEKLY OPPORTUNITIES

Sundays—

We gather in the Sanctuary every Sunday morning for worship with Holy Communion at 8:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Educational opportunities are available between services for people of all ages:

- *Grace Time (children age 3 and under) is a time set aside in the nursery for a story and craft from 10:00-10:30 a.m.*
- *Godly Play (children ages 4-5) meets in the second-floor education suite from 9:55-10:50 a.m.*
- *Trinity Village (grades K-5) meets in the second-floor education suite from 9:55-10:50 a.m.*
- *Confirmation (grades 6-9) meets in the fourth-floor sky room from 9:30-10:45 a.m.*
- *High School youth group meets periodically for special events and discussions.*
- *Adults of all ages meet in the second-floor library from 10:00-10:45 a.m. for the adult forum.*

Tuesdays—

A fluid group of congregants meets on Tuesdays at 11:00 a.m. in the office conference room to study the worship readings assigned for the upcoming Sunday. Participants need not attend every session, and no prior bible experience is necessary. Following the discussion, staff and congregants share a brownbag lunch at 12:00 p.m. Some people choose to skip the study and simply come to lunch!

WORSHIP AND MUSIC from Cantor David Sims



If there's space in the bulletin I like to include the text of the choir's anthem. Sometimes I can find it online and copy and paste, but usually it's faster to simply type it out. Same thing for hymns that I insert in the bulletin using music notation software—I have to type out each stanza, including all the little hyphens. But, I've found that I really enjoy typing out these kinds of texts. I always gain a new appreciation for the poetry of the words, which should be able to stand alone from the music. I'll notice different words and phrases, or how punctuation subtly changes the meaning of what we sing. (Ask me about my favorite punctuation mark in ELW 479 "We Come to the Hungry Feast.")

This is part of the reason I love physical hymnals or bulletins with all of the prayers written out: it allows all of us to hold and examine the texts we say and sing on our own time, not just in the moment it happens during worship together. You can repeat a prayer for the week at home or re-read a hymn text after we've sung it. One of my favorite parts of singing in a choir is experiencing a text or melody for many weeks, not just once on Sunday morning. Just like typing it out, you internalize a poem by rehearsing it, or a melody will stay with you for a long time when you've worked hard to sing it each week.

If you'd like to spend more time with the texts, melodies, and harmonies we sing on Sunday mornings, we have two adult choirs that help to lead worship. The Adult Choir sings almost every Sunday from September–May at the 11:00 a.m. service, and rehearses in the choir room on Wednesdays from 7:30-9:00 p.m. We sing a wide variety of choral literature, psalm antiphons, and other liturgical music. Trinity Singers provides choral music at the 8:45 a.m. service the second Sunday of each month, and rehearses in the Sanctuary the Wednesday prior from 6:30-7:30 p.m. It has been a great option for people whose schedules don't allow them to rehearse and sing each week, as well as parents of children who are in choir at the same time. If you are interested in singing with either group, or sharing your other musical talent in worship, let me know! We would be glad to have you.

CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILY MINISTRY from Ann Schrooten

I read recently that a child needs 4-6 interested adults in their life—other than their parents—to experience a healthy sense of self. Think back to when you were a child. Who were those other interested adults in your life that helped to shape who you are today? Our family had a friend who, over the years, had taught three of my five brothers in school. I never had Agatha Orr as a teacher, but she had a profound impact on me just the same. When I was in 6th grade, she “hired” me to come to her classroom after school to erase and wash the chalkboards, wipe off the desks, clean up the art area, tend the bulletin boards, and even grade some of the papers turned in by her first graders. I received \$10 at the end of each week. Perhaps it was that I was the only girl among five boys that inspired her decision to reach out to me, or maybe she saw the future teacher in me and wanted to share her experience and passion for children. Whatever her reasons, I LOVED going to her classroom each day! It was a place where I could be my best self, connect with an interesting adult, and dream of what I would be someday.



As I consider the opportunities awaiting *all of us* to connect with the children and youth of our congregation, I wonder if you might be surprised by the following. Within the Holy Trinity community, we have NINETY children and youth from newborns to seniors in high school! This represents ten percent of our membership! If it is true that each of these children needs 4-6 other adults in their life, then I wonder where the 360-540 adults will come from for these incredible young people? Many will no doubt be teachers and coaches. Some will be neighbors who live next door or down the block. And yes, some will be part of this community of faith into which these children are being raised. I see interested adults all around me here at Holy Trinity—members of our body who teach Godly Play and Trinity Village and Confirmation each and every week. I see Confirmation Sponsors who have “adopted” a middle school student to accompany them on their journey of faith. I see pastors who welcome each and every one of these young people to the table of Jesus Christ BY NAME. I am grateful for the many adults from this community who have volunteered to cook a meal for our choir or confirmation kids, taken time off to travel with our youth on a summer trip, walked alongside our high school students as they MARCHED FOR OUR LIVES at the Minnesota Capitol, or hugged a young singer as you came into Adult Choir rehearsal on a Wednesday night. As the body of Christ, we follow the lead of Jesus, who says that *it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs* (Mt. 19:14, Lk. 18:16 and Mk. 10:14).

Our faith is passed on in the context of community, and we all have a part to play. If you are a parent, encourage your child to be present in this community regularly. There are some pretty amazing and interested adults waiting to welcome your child. And to all the other adults in the congregation, I invite you to look for the children. Welcome them, sit with them, talk to them, listen to them, and sing with them, for this is the way of Jesus.

SUMMER PARISH ORGANIZING HIGHLIGHTS from Meghan Olsen Biebighauser

If you visited the Community Room this summer after either of our services, you noticed a Community Organizing corner in the southeast part of the room. Each week congregational members and visitors gathered around a leading question—but often the conversations took us far beyond the original topic! We listened to one another reflect on our neighborhoods—our hopes and our concerns. We asked one another where we saw hope in the past week, how we make choices with our money that reflects our faith values, what are our favorite ways to care for God’s creation around us. Thanks to all of you who spent some time in conversation in that space this summer—let’s be sure to keep listening to one another as we move forward in ministry together.

As I listened to this community, many people were finding hope in some of our congregation’s ministries, including:

- The Refugee Resettlement Team is preparing to welcome a family of nine to the Twin Cities at the end of August. This large team of leaders has been hard at work collecting items to prepare a household, and Holy Trinity, in partnership with the Minnesota Council of Churches, will continue to accompany this family for three months after their arrival. At a time when the refugee resettlement process is under threat, here’s a hopeful development!
- Holy Trinity’s Sanctuary Team has been working closely with other congregations in South Minneapolis to make sure that individuals and families who are seeking refuge in congregations have what they need. There have been several instances of successful legal challenges to deportation attempts—sanctuary works!

I look forward to a full fall season, serving alongside you in our community.

Sunday, September 23—Innovation Hub Welcome in Worship

Holy Trinity is one of twelve congregations that was recently selected to participate in a program through Augsburg University's Riverside Innovation Hub. The program provides learning opportunities for our congregants, a coach trained by the Riverside Innovation Hub, and up to \$30,000 to deepen our ministry with young adults. This is an exciting opportunity!

And here is a brief introduction from the coach, who will spend 20 hours a week with us this year:

My name is Asefa Melka Wakjira. I was born and raised in rural Ethiopia. My father finished grade four. He is retired Lutheran Church evangelist. My mother is strong and wise but she has never been to school. I have 10 siblings, and I'm the 9th.

I like to say I'm a child of a farmer from rural Africa who got opportunity to be educated because of committed missionaries from Norway, Sweden, Germany and other countries. I finished college in Ethiopia and got my bachelor in Sociology. Besides that, I led campus ministry.

After working as a graduate assistant for two years, I got scholarship to study Sociology of Children in Norway for two years. Living in Norway opened my eyes to new culture.

During my study in Norway, I got clear vision that I will serve in congregations. Then I prayed, and God opened opportunity to study here in the USA. I finished my Masters of Divinity last May from San Francisco Theological Seminary in California.

I hope to bring diverse educational backgrounds like sociology of children and theology. In addition to that, I will bring new culture of food, worship, and ministry from Ethiopia. I also like to step out of my comfort zone and try new things. But it was not easy for me to be outgoing person before I went to Norway. I remember the difficulty I faced to adjust to new food and weather in Norway. It was very confusing to see sun at 10 p.m. for me, and I could not sleep on time for the first two weeks. I also could not try new food for almost a month except the Ethiopian food that I brought with me from home. I believe, adjusting to new environments takes time. I like to continue to learn new culture and listen to stories of people. That is one of the important lessons I look forward to learning more during the next 10 months of ministry.

Sunday, September 27-29—Black Master Storytelling Festival



Sunday, October 14—2018 Johnson Symposium entitled “Repentance and Resistance”

We are living in a time of coarse inhumanity in the public square. Messages of fear, scarcity, and exclusion dominate the news and threaten to divide us. Many of us are deeply disturbed by the direction of public discourse. Others of us are more intimately affected; our lives, our families, and our way of life are endangered by the rhetoric and the regulations it emboldens.

As people of faith, we seek to resist what theologian Eric Barreto calls “the arrogations of the empire — the power to terrorize, to arrest the innocent, to refuse the refugee, to execute the powerless.” Our faith calls us to hear the cries and the hopes of our neighbors and be moved by them. In this moment in history, we pray that God will pry us off of dead center. For as German Lutheran theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer once observed, “silence in the face of evil is evil itself...Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act.”

To this end, the theme for this year’s Johnson Symposium is “Repentance and Resistance.” The evening will commence with a confession that throughout history the Christian community’s silence has too often amplified our neighbors’ suffering. We will then privilege the voices of Imam Asad Zaman and Rabbi Michael Latz, who will offer reflections on the current situation in the public square through the lenses of their respective faith traditions. Following their presentations, Senator John Marty will invite us to connect what we have heard with faith in action in the public square. Finally, we will invite all attendees to participate in a social media campaign that seeks to replace fear with love, scarcity with abundance, and exclusion with radical inclusion. (Don’t do social media? That’s okay. We’ll have something for you, too.)



Everything Happens for a Reason with Pastor Ingrid**

Kate Bowler is a professor at Duke Divinity School with a modest Christian upbringing, but she specializes in the study of the prosperity gospel, a creed that sees fortune as a blessing from God and misfortune as a mark of God's disapproval. At thirty-five, everything in her life seems to point toward "blessing." She is thriving in her job, married to her high school sweetheart, and loves life with her newborn son.

Then she is diagnosed with stage IV colon cancer.

The prospect of her own mortality forces Kate to realize that she has been tacitly subscribing to the prosperity gospel, living with the conviction that she can control the shape of her life with "a surge of determination." Even as this type of Christianity celebrates the American can-do spirit, it implies that if you "can't do" and succumb to illness or misfortune, you are a failure. Kate is very sick, and no amount of positive thinking will shrink her tumors. What does it mean to die, she wonders, in a society that insists everything happens for a reason? Kate is stripped of this certainty only to discover that without it, life is hard but beautiful in a way it never has been before.

Frank and funny, dark and wise, Kate Bowler pulls the reader deeply into her life in an account she populates affectionately with a colorful, often hilarious retinue of friends, mega-church preachers, relatives, and doctors. This book tells her story, offering up her irreverent, hard-won observations on dying and the ways it has taught her to live.


