## GOD NAMES ALL BELOVED

Sunday morning began as usual. I've made a sort of New Year's resolution to keep the four plants in my office alive as long as possible. I noticed that one in the window sill looked a little droopy. I grabbed the watering can. Something outside the window caught my eye. There was a man on the sidewalk outside our church. He was carrying a rather large sign with hateful, homophobic language. I must confess, my initial impulse was less than pastoral. Moving briskly toward the door, I met one of our parishioners who was also concerned about the protestor's presence. We informed Pastor Ingrid and she felt it was imperative to assemble a visible loving response. Just then, DeWayne and Marcea Townsend walked through the church doors. Pastor Ingrid commissioned DeWayne to serve as a loving presence. He stood next to the man to offer a kind word of welcome to people as they arrived for worship. Marcea got to work making large signs that read "You Are Loved" to be placed in front of the church.

Pastor Ingrid and I went outside and we were met with insults and accusations. Nevertheless, we invited him to worship and tried to offer the compassion of Christ. Pastor Ingrid suggested that we begin worship outside but she would "let me know." Worship time was quickly approaching, but Pastor Ingrid was still outside, shining her light and love. So, I invited the congregation to join her. She led us in the Thanksgiving for Baptism amid the protestor's shouts. But bravely, she continued. David Sims and Ann Schrooten led us in our singing. As we sang *This Little Light of Mine*, the January air became a little warmer. We returned to the sanctuary and continued worship.

Pastor Ingrid delivered a powerful sermon to remind us that: *[God] "continually saturates our lives with unconditional love... One might argue that this understanding of our own belovedness could cause us to turn us in on ourselves—causing us to care more about our sacredness than the sacredness of others. But if Luke's gospel is clear about anything, it is that God's promises are spoken for the whole world. Blessing for one doesn't mean less blessing for another. Love for one doesn't mean less love for another. Grace for one doesn't mean less grace for another. God's world is not a pie; it's a renewable resource. There is more than enough. We need not worry... God's love is for the baptized and for those who will never find themselves at the font. God's love is for the healthy and for the sick. God's love is for the rich and the poor. God's Love is for the people inside this sanctuary and for the man protesting outside on the street. God's love is for those who stand at the center of society and for those who are consistently pushed to the margins. Today we are reminded that "Beloved" is the name given to all, without exception. And for this we say thanks be to God!"*

Siblings in Christ, I cannot overstate how proud I am to belong to a congregation who is dedicated to the body of Christ and willing to put their faith into action. I came across a post on social media from Katie Murray. With permission, I share her heartfelt reflection from yesterday: *When you show up at church and the community is gathered on the steps, your mind first runs through whether you missed something in the newsletter or the liturgical calendar. Then you see the protester using God's words of love as a weapon, expressing condemnation for the LGBTQ community that your church embraces and you realize that the gathering on the steps is actually your community's response to this individual. You start to cry when you realize that the people you worship with are standing outside singing, putting love and light into the world in response to this attempt to weaponize the gospel. And when you try to explain to your kids why that person is there, you reinforce that our belief in God is a belief in love. Period. And you feel like that protester in fact is a demonstration that your community is doing something right.*

Indeed, God's love is for everyone. No. Exceptions.
