KINGLY THEOLOGY

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. rose to the foreground as one of the most prominent leaders during the civil rights struggle. Although his contributions to the civil rights movement are immeasurable and often remembered, King has provided the church with a theological treasure as well. King's theology is many things. It is dynamic, revolutionary, and loving. But, unlike traditionally regarded theologians, King's theology was actually lived. His daughter, Bernice King, described his life as a "walking sermon inspired by God." King was active in what he believed. In so doing King has left us with a unique theological inheritance that has provided a foundation out of which other theologies have grown.

Although his powerful life was tragically cut short, Dr. King has left us with a living legacy of a Christian answer to racism, segregation, violence, and other evils. Yet, we are left to speculate how he would respond to certain issues. Admittedly, we cannot be absolutely certain what King's response would be today in light of people who live on the margins of society. Yet, we can be confident that he would respond with action, love, and hope. Dr. King's words from the past serve as indicators to what his present actions might be. "We are called to speak for the weak, for the voiceless, for the victims of our nation."¹

I believe that if King were alive today, he would embrace the struggles of all who are oppressed. He would encourage us to use the weapon of love to fight the battle of the 'isms'. "The love of God manifested in the cross of Christ requires social justice as a basis for authentic community... human rights for those on the margins of society could not be ignored... basic human rights for the poor constitute a theological and moral baseline for the community."² Christians in America and around the globe can benefit from King's theological legacy. In fact, people from all faith communities can incorporate King's teachings in the universal quest for the 'beloved community'. King encourages all faith communities to move from belief to action. As the struggle for equality continues, we should find both challenge and comfort from King's words. Everyone is responsible for seeking their purpose in creating the 'beloved community' that King hoped for. Each member of the community is valuable and necessary. All should be invited to the table and every voice should be heard. King believed that we are all children of God and therefore worthy of dignity and respect. "Every human being has etched in his personality the indelible stamp of the creator."³ May these words inspire us as we remember a "King among theologians."
