SERMON FROM SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 8

In reflecting on this part of Luke’s gospel, Barbara Brown Taylor says that “[Jesus] would not have made a good [local church pastor]. So much of the job depends on making it easy for people to come to church and rewarding for them to stay. Talk to any of the church growth experts and they will tell you how important it is to create a safe, caring environment where people will believe their concerns will be heard and their needs be met. The basic idea is to find out what people are looking for and to give it to them, so that they decide to stay put instead of continuing to shop for a church down the street.”

Before you head over to St. Albert the Great to hear what Father Joe has to say, first hear me out...In our current social and political climate, I think that the use of the word “hate” has the potential to get in the way of our engaging with this passage, which is why I’m grateful that Eugene Peterson, in his translation of the bible called *The Message*, translates this passage another way. *The Message* reads, “One day when large groups of people were walking along with him, Jesus turned and told them, “Anyone who comes to me but refuses to let go of father, mother, spouse, children, brothers, sisters—yes, even one’s own self!—can’t be my disciple...Simply put, if you’re not willing to take what is dearest to you, whether plans or people, and kiss it good-bye, you can’t be my disciple.”

The favorite nighttime book at our house these days is called *The Little Island*. It’s a sweet little children’s book that I picked up in Maine earlier this summer that tells the harrowing story of an island, a fish, and a little black kitten. Each night, as I read the story that describes what happens on the little island, I am struck by these words, “Then one day all the lobsters crawled in from the sea and hid under the rocks and ledges of the Island to shed their shells and let their new ones grow... strong in hiding places in the dark.”

Shedding our shells, letting go, hating that which gets in the way of abundant life for all—take your pick. Being a follower of Jesus means letting that which keeps us separated from God and from one another to fall away.

This fall is packed with opportunities to gather together and to “shed our shells,” so to speak. A storytelling workshop with Mark Yaconelli in October will help us to shed the shell of isolation so that vulnerability and relationship might grow. The symposium this year will allow the #fakenews of American history to fall away so we can hear indigenous historians and Native leaders speaking truth. Our youth are going to lead us in a renewed conversation about gender and sexuality, in order that we might continue to let go of language and practices that exclude LGBTQIA+ people and live into a renewed commitment to full inclusion. Holy Trinity, we are going to be shedding our shells all over the place; be careful where you step.

The truth is that all of this letting go can be daunting—for pastors, too. I wondered this week, when all these defenses have fallen away, what on earth are we left with? We are left with everything we need: God’s certain promises; our undeniable giftedness; the Spirit’s fiery presence in our lives. When all of our defenses have fallen away, we are left with love that is stronger than any shell that’s been shed. And that’s good news, not only for those of us gathered here, but for the whole world.

People of God, Jesus wasn’t so much concerned about keeping people happy as he was leading them toward abundant life. Today we thank God that it’s our turn to follow.
