## ADVENT DEVOTIONAL

In lieu of the Advent Devotional Booklet, devotions will be featured in the Community Church Newsletter throughout the season.

There are 3 texts assigned to the devotion today. I read them several times to see which made me think.

Psalm 21 is a celebration psalm, thanking God for victories, for a good life and for future good times to come. I am thankful for all the blessings I have been given, but I want to think beyond thankfulness.

Isaiah 41:14-20 starts with a rather graphic picture of God providing a sharp-toothed threshing instrument which can tear enemies apart, making chaff of mountains. Having grown up on a farm and seeing what these sharp-toothed harvesting machines can do, I find the imagery a bit too graphic.

So that brought me to Romans 15:14-21. Paul says to the Romans in Verse 14 that "[he] is convinced, brothers and sisters, that you are filled with goodness, filled with knowledge, able to instruct each other." Certainly that can be written to us at Holy Trinity. But then Paul goes on to say that at times we must admonish each other. That resonates with me as well, and seems to say that people who are well-meaning with good intentions can still make mistakes.

I read these lines today at the same time I was reading a front-page article in the Tribune about a Minneapolis church whose members had created beautiful tapestries. The tapestries had been commissioned and designed by a British artist and were stitched over a long period of time by a dedicated group of church members called the "needlers." The tapestries were displayed in the community room of the church. Unfortunately, the tapestries portrayed an idealized view of the "first Thanksgiving" which we now know is not correct, as well as a painful image of a slave ship. The church finally voted to retire the tapestry, but acknowledge the "needlers." I could put myself in both places. I can feel empathy for the needlers, who answered a call to create something of beauty for their church, who worked many hours and developed a camaraderie with friends. They did not design the tapestry and did the work before our current awareness of how hurtful and dishonest these images are. In the article in the paper, it seems as if the church has found a way to acknowledge the goodness of all and also remove the tapestry with its hurtful images.

I had a smaller, but similar experience. Both of my grandmothers were knitters, crocheters, and embroiderers. In the '20s and '30s, they embroidered on pillowcases and flour sack dish towels. Patterns were printed on these flour sacks. They were packed away by my mother and other relatives, not used. When my mother died, I inherited boxes of dish towels, pillowcases, table cloths, and doilies. I thought that after 70-80 years, it was time to use them. I pulled out the dish towels with flowers, with butterflies, with tasks for each day of the week. Then I came to the bottom of the box. There they were, a carefully stitched set of 7 racist dish towels. They depicted black children at various tasks, carefully embroidered dots of black for hair, stereotypical sayings mimicking black speech. I had a dilemma. First, I knew I couldn't use them or donate them to any place. I finally found someone doing workshops on racial awareness who could use them. I also decided that my grandmothers were still "full of goodness." I knew that they would not have done this embroidery if they felt anyone would feel pain on looking at them. I thought of the work they had put into doing them. It led me to wonder what I may be doing to cause pain to someone today.

I will long think of how we can be "full of goodness" and inadvertently cause pain to others. I pray that we will all continue to learn, listen to each other, and admonish each other.
