



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND EDUCATION COORDINATOR

It is my honor to introduce our newest member of the Holy Trinity team, Deacon David (pronounced DAH-VEED) Rojas Martínez. Deacon David will be joining us May 18, 2020.

Deacon David will graduate in May from Luther Seminary with a focus on Justice and Reconciliation. The interview team (Pastor Ingrid, Pastor Angela, Deb Sodt, and Katie Schroeder) were impressed by his many gifts: he is professionally bilingual (Spanish/English); he has worked with peacebuilding and reconciliatory work within intercultural settings; he has a deep passion for education for people of all ages and backgrounds. His ministry is driven by his Christian faith and professional training as a consecrated deacon of the Lutheran Diaconal Association.

As our Community Engagement and Education Coordinator, Deacon David will work to advance our congregation's justice priorities and educational opportunities for all ages. Some of his duties include:

- Coordinate ministry programs for children and youth (birth-grade 12) and support the work of the Children and Family and Youth Committees.
- Meet with Holy Trinity members of all ages one-on-one to develop relationships and help members discern their gifts and passions.
- Meet with community leaders and organizations to learn about and understand the justice issues that affect the congregation and community.
- Supervise nursery staff.
- Oversee the Public Voice and Organizing Committee and its working groups (e.g. Racial Justice, Sanctuary/AMMPARO, Reconciling, Israel/Palestine, Doctrine of Discovery, Caring for Creation, Meals on Wheels).
- Collaborate with other staff members and the Adult Education Committee to plan and evaluate ministry programs.
- Lead worship regularly.

READINGS

Acts 2:14a, 36-41; Psalm 116:1-4, 12-19;
1 Peter 1:17-23; Luke 24:13-35

Deacon David has ample ministry experience:

- He has served as a Diaconal Intern at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Frankfort, Indiana, where he assisted the pastor by leading bible studies, preaching monthly, and translating for the local free health clinic. His supervisor, The Rev. Michael L. Crawford said, "He is a good example of Luther's observation, 'In the good we do, we are just little Christs to each other.'"
- He served as Head Sacristan in the Chapel of the Resurrection at Valparaiso University. The Rev. Dr. Rachuy Cox affirms, "David's presence was indispensable. He carried out his numerous responsibilities with exemplary grace. David never disappointed. I am confident that Deacon David has a servant's heart and sees others— whoever they are—as beloved of God, worthy of God's service...David is an incarnational leader, gifted with skills which he takes care to develop and strengthen—for the sake of the whole. He seeks to be faithful to the call of ministry that God has placed upon his heart. David truly believes that the vast and beautiful diversity of the world is a reflection of the image of God, and David lives his life seeking to embrace that diversity and encouraging and empowering others to do the same"

Deacon David will clearly be an asset to our congregation. He has respect for and openness to others, while remaining grounded in his own sense of self. His many personal, professional, and academic experiences allow him a rich theological perspective that is approachable for people of all ages, including those in the first third of life. He is dedicated to making resources available to the least of us and to helping members of the majority culture think about how to best help the neighbor. In his own words, Deacon David is eager to minister with Holy Trinity as we "continually call the congregation to look beyond its walls and engage the neighbor, creation, and society because this is where the Church's work is certainly needed!"

I am overjoyed to welcome Deacon David Rojas Martínez to Holy Trinity. When he reaches out to you for a one-to-one conversation, I trust you will welcome Deacon David and shower him with Christlike hospitality.

For several days a podcast I listened to reverberated in my head and heart. It spoke of discrimination against Asian Americans, today in the throes of Coronavirus, and in years past with struggling immigrants. Innocent people today are being blamed for COVID-19 and we know this same dynamic has happened with disease spread in the past. The podcast message especially touched me because a member of our immediate family is Asian American, as are several cousins. Hearing family stories of hateful comments coming their way in a time already fraught with stress is very disturbing. It's inexcusable!
