# MESSAGE FROM NICKI HINES

Along with the communications that Ingrid and team are sending to all Holy Trinity members, I wanted to send you a brief update. Some of you have been able to get to church over the past few days and others haven't, so I wanted to share a bit more about what's going on at the building.

The generosity of the community has been abundant and overflowing. Supported by a posting in the Star Tribune yesterday encouraging donations be brought to Holy Trinity, the church basement and sanctuary are full of food and household items for neighbors. Over the weekend we received donations and gave them out as fast as we could. Today we continue to receive and distribute food, diapers, baby food, household items, personal hygiene products, etc.

A group of HT members are coordinating volunteers, communications, and logistics. Megan Olsen Biebighauser's dual role of HT member and Minneapolis Area Synod employee is serving us well as she draws upon HT and Synod people to help. There are others who are leading/helping, including, of course, our fearless three pastors and staff, Ann and David (what a first few weeks on the job for David!), and others. My rambling here is not meant to be a full accounting of the staff, but to let you know it is being managed.

Today, Monday, people can drop off donations and pick up needed supplies from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Each day we are learning how to improve on our ability to serve the community. As Ingrid noted in an email this weekend, we served thousands last week in our ministry, and we expect to continue.

Updates are being posted on Holy Trinity's Facebook page, and calls for volunteers, as needed, are being posted on Holy Trinity's Family Ministry Facebook page. Please watch those for frequent updates.

The world has changed in just one week (even more so than it already had). Council's decision two weeks ago to keep the doors of our church closed until September has been altered.

But Holy Trinity is called to serve, and we will.

In another previous council meeting, Ingrid shared a vision of Holy Trinity having porous walls, that there be little distinction between what happens inside the building and outside. Today, the walls are indeed melting away.

Thank you for continuing to lead and serve in this time.

# Reflection from Racial Justice Team member, Emily Kosilla Content warning: Black Maternal Mortality

Late in April, this <u>news story</u> was released of Amber Rose Isaacs's story, a black pregnant woman who tweeted that she was concerned about the maternity care she had been receiving from a Bronx hospital, and that she didn't feel like she would survive her upcoming labor. She tragically died within hours of birthing her baby due to a platelet condition that was missed in pregnancy.

As a doula, I've seen firsthand the long-lasting racial health disparities that are being severely exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. My heart breaks for Amber and her family, and I really invite my fellow white folks to sit in that heartbreak with me. We need to be sharing and talking about these stories and analyzing the part we play in them.

#### **Reflection Questions**

- Have you or your friends or family approached childbirth with the kind of dread and fear Amber Isaac possessed? Why or why not?
- Think of 2 people in your sphere of influence you can talk about this story with. What meaningful actions can you take to ensure this doesn't continue to happen?

MN Healing Justice Network is a collaboration of over 100 Twin Cities BIPOC healers. There are many doula's and midwives in their network who are committed to reducing Black Maternal Mortality. Folks are encouraged to give time/resources and engage with their social media accounts.
