COMMUNITIES OF CALLING: LECTIO DIVINA (READING SCRIPTURE)

Group Description: Come join us for Lectio Divina. Lectio is reading scripture not to study it but to open ourselves and listen carefully to what God is saying to each of us personally in this moment. We will read short passages repeatedly as a group, listen, and share as we choose what we heard. Finally, we will share a snack and get to know each other better. We hope to leave each session with friend-ship and a word from God.

Our Communities of Calling small group practices Lextio Divina together regularly. We had one session in person before the Covid lockdown began. Kathy Howe explained that she'd found Lectio Divina to be a meaningful way to listen to the Holy Spirit and share it with others. Dennis O'Brien studied it and added history and academic knowledge for the group. We tried it that first night and agreed to keep meeting. Since then we've met on Zoom every two weeks.

Each meeting we greet each other and check-in on our health and well being. We open with prayer, then begin.

Our ritual:

The rotating leader chooses a short Bible passage.

The passage is read aloud three times by different people. Between each reading we sit quietly for 3-5 minutes listening for a word, a phrase, a thought that God was speaking to each one of us in that moment.

At the end of the reading and listening, we share, if we choose, what we heard, what we were comforted by, what we were called to do, and which words we will take with us on our journey. In these moments we learn to know and love ourselves, each other, and God. The Holy Spirit is there.

"Wherever you are in your journey of faith" are words we hear every Sunday morning. Holy Trinity is a wonderful, supportive, energetic community, but we are reminded our own journey of faith is personal.

I signed up for Lectio Divina with a vague notion of what it was. Now I really look forward to our quiet, meditative, thoughtful Zoom time every two weeks, especially as the world changes around us. The five of us are glad to be at Holy Trinity, but we have each been members less than 6 years. We met each other through Lectio Divina.

I feel that a strength of Lectio Divina is that it could be done by someone meeting Jesus and the scriptures for the first time as well as someone like me who has been a Lutheran for 73 years and finds something new in familiar words. I can do this a long time.

I have recent history of finding meaning in contemplative prayer groups. Over time, Kathy and I shared our experiences and our desire for such groups again.

Much to my delight, this winter she told me of the Lectio Divina focus group beginning here at Holy Trinity. So the group began. Now every other week we practice together on Zoom.

What magnificent, intimate connections and fellowship has sprung forth in just a short time. Each session we pray the Ancient Practice of Praying the Scriptures, quieting, contemplating silently, meditating, listening, and then sharing. This is repeated for the entire prayer meeting.

My goal, and, I think, the group's conscience, is to learn to intensely pray in meditation, deeply enter that place, ground my contemplation solidly, and move toward an intense love and celebration of the Word, and, most importantly, having communication with the One who calls us "Friend."

Deep calling Deep. Finding, entering, what Richard Rohr calls our "True Selves." For me, FINALLY learning how to SHUT UP AND LISTEN! I am learning to let God have the first word.

Q AND A WITH BRUCE AXELROD

Interview conducted by !! Elena Vaughn for the Longfellow/Nokomis Messenger On the back of Bruce "Uncle Bubba" Axelrod's shirt reads a Cesar Chavez quote: "The people who give you their food give you their heart." A self-described "Buddhist Iew -boy who loves Jesus" from the Bronx, Bruce has been a resident of Trinity Apartments for five years, but has loved Holy Trinity Lutheran Church for thirty. Bruce gave the Messenger an inside



look at life in the immediate aftermath.

What has your experience been during this time? "I love our community, the diversity and people and struggle, We've been at ground Zero with the fires, and we support the Black Lives Matter (BLM), a lot of us, and we believe that there's been perpetrators from the outside setting the fires. We don't believe BLM would destroy the community. We love all the energy and people coming in and helping us. It's been very healing."

What have been some of the harder parts of this experience? "It's been traumatic being here, we're still afraid at night. We've been afraid every night for our building burning, but we're here to stay. We're about struggle and peace and justice and making the world a better place for everybody, no matter who you are."

How does your personal experience affect your view of the recent uprisings?

"I've been in the streets against the United States Government...since I've been 17 years old. I wanna see systemic change. I wanna see the racism treated in this country. I ain't against the police, I ain't against no one, but when you're hurting people and killing people, that's no good. I wanna see our tax dollars used for something besides making war. I wanna see it being used for education, for roads, for better lives, for affordable housing. We work so hard and we ain't got time for our children or ourselves cuz we're so busy, and it shouldn't be that hard to make do."
