GOD IS WITH US

I watched the news this morning. The coronavirus crisis is escalating. There are over 140,000 deaths in the United States alone. Some states are even considering reinstating stay at home orders. In the face of this pandemic, the only thing we know for sure is that we are surrounded by uncertainty. This pandemic brings a myriad of challenges: layoffs, medical supply shortages, lack of basic essentials, and a tsunami of financial woes throughout the business sector. People are fighting, literally attacking each other over wearing or not wearing facemasks.

Siblings in Christ, I know it's hard not to worry. I'm concerned about my parents who are in their late seventies. I'm concerned about extended family living in Namibia. Yet, even in this storm of uncertainty, I do experience a modicum of calm. I'm comforted knowing exactly where my children are because all of my little chickadees are at home. I don't have to worry if my daughter is being bullied at school - again. I'm not worried about our oldest child who is living with Autism, that today is the day he has a meltdown and the school calls the police, resulting in a tragic ending. Even though we are living with a keen recognition of what we can and cannot control. I find a peculiar peace in knowing that it is easier to protect my children from COVID-19 than it is to protect them from the everyday injustices that minoritized people often face.

As we negotiate how to live connected lives while practicing social distancing, may we be encouraged that community still happens. Every time we let ourselves follow the wind of the Spirit of God, we are in community. When we choose love over hate, when we offer forgiveness even though vengeance would be far easier, we are in community. When we embrace every opportunity to choose hope over fear, we are in community

When we are unable to meet God in our familiar worship spaces, we discover that our God is not limited by the locations in which we gather. Many of us are accustomed to encountering God through corporate worship. Thankfully, the Spirit is active beyond our buildings, pipe organs, and worship books. Our Savior is fond of breaking boundaries. During this pandemic, we have broadened the ways in which we worship. Thanks be to God! Our God cannot be contained. Daily I remind myself of Paul's words, "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:38-39).

I've asked myself repeatedly, "Is the Good News still good in the midst of a global health crises? In the midst of all forms of oppression?" Absolutely! Jesus makes it clear. "Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."
