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INSTITUTIONAL RACISM. WHAT'S NEXT?

"Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better." —Maya Angelou

More than 100 members of Holy Trinity have listened to Alicia Sojourner's presentation on Institutional Racism at Holy Trinity and have read her consultation report. We're grateful for Alicia's deep listening, her collection and interpretation of data, and her insights around equity and inclusion within our walls. She applauds us for the strong passion we have around racial justice. She also challenges us to attend to the gaps still needing attention so that we can be true to our Christian calling as diverse and equally beloved children of God.

In response to Alicia's findings several actions are already in motion. A small congregational equity team is forming to take action on at least one of the "messier gaps" in equity that were uncovered in the report. For example, the consultation reveals that as an organization we are not as welcoming and inclusive as we think we are to people who are not from a Northern European background. How can we create an environment that not only welcomes but also *includes* all people, that truly engages with and values each unique person? Our Church Council is evaluating two of its practices through a lens of equity and inclusion: the nominating process for council membership and how its meetings are conducted and decisions are made. Is the nominating process open-minded and impartial, valuing all skills and perspectives at this leadership level? Are the meetings conducted in a way such that all voices are valued, encouraged, and heard? Church staff is also taking action and using the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) to grow their individual and group skills in multicultural competence.

We're all learning in this journey towards being a more racially just organization. We need to keep using a racial lens to look at all aspects of our congregational life where equity and inclusion might not be fully realized—faith formation of children and adults, music and arts that enrich our faith, how and where we spend money, how we hire and retain staff and what could be missing in policies and procedures. In our day-to-day interactions, we need to have the grace and the space with each other to speak up when we hear comments or see actions that diminish the full worth of others. Even if we're not sure, let's raise the question. It can be hard, and none of us has this fully mastered, but we get better and learn only with courage and practice.

Holy Trinity has a long history of work on racial justice and attending to the needs of the marginalized. For this we can be proud. We are engaged in yet another initiative with organizational racism. The consultation encourages us to expand our vision of what it would look like to dismantle white privilege and be an anti-racist organization. It's a long journey of undoing the patterns of centuries. Maya Angelou's words embolden us to "do better" and we know we can. Together, we will arrive at a more equitable future. —Libby Olstad & Nicki Hines

ANTI-RACISM ACTION STEPS

Alicia Sojourner's consultation on institutional racism challenges us to take anti-racism actions to meet our congregational equity and inclusion goals. At her recommendation, we plan to set up several small teams in the coming months to begin this work. These teams of 7-8 members will select several of the more challenging gaps in racial justice within Holy Trinity. They will use data from the consultation to develop action plans and means of measuring success. Others will be recruited to help with the work to be done. Action steps will be coordinated with staff leadership and Council, with some guidance from Alicia. We expect their work to start in late August or early September.
