STEPPING OUT IN FAITH UPDATE

The work of the "Stepping Out in Faith" task force has continued throughout the summer months, and many of you have been actively involved. Thank you to everyone who responded to the congregational survey in July and to those who participated in one of the recent focus group discussions. There was an incredible amount of thoughtful and detailed feedback shared through these two methods, and it has given the task force a great deal to consider and discuss.

A quick recap on the process to date... Holy Trinity was the beneficiary of a large and unexpected financial windfall from the sale of Trinity Apartments. The Church Council formed the "Stepping Out in Faith" task force to determine how the funds can best be stewarded, in line with the congregation's mission and for the benefit of the community. The task force is comprised of Council President Nicki Hines, ZoeAna Martinez, Randy Nelson, Mike Nevergall, Libby Olstad, Tina Russell, Pastor Angela, and Pastor Ingrid. The work of the task force is to discern a proposed allocation of the gain on sale, which amounted to approximately five million dollars. For the time being, the Church Council approved the investment of these funds with the ELCA Foundation and the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. The money is safe and accessible as needed.

In July, a congregational survey was distributed, and there were 123 respondents. The survey asked for input on a variety of areas current areas of ministry at Holy Trinity, potential new areas of ministry, social justice issues, future planning, and how we define our "community." Several common themes emerged from the survey results. Respondents commonly defined the "community" of Holy Trinity as Longfellow and the surrounding neighborhoods and saw importance in Holy Trinity continuing to be an active neighbor in that community. Respondents commonly had an interest in seeing some funds used for the direct benefit of the congregation, through new and enhanced programming or in capital investments in our physical spaces. Respondents commonly described an enduring commitment by the congregation to social justice issues, with racial justice, environmental justice, and affordable housing as the priorities. The survey also invited respondents to share general feedback about the process, and the task force members reviewed all survey responses.

As a next step, the task force hosted six focus group sessions in August and September, along with a number of one-on-one conversations with members who were not able to participate in a group. There were nearly 70 members who participated in a focus group or a one-on-one conversation. We sought to ensure that participants reflected overall congregational demographics. These focus group sessions provided a forum for task force members to dig more deeply into some of the common themes that emerged from the survey results and ask participants to respond with additional feedback.

In the initial planning work of the task force, we discussed the need to seek feedback from the wider Longfellow community—business owners, neighbors, elected officials, not-for-profit organizations, etc. (Continued in next column)

After George Floyd's murder and in the aftermath of the uprising that followed, Holy Trinity has been thrust into the middle of these conversations in a way we never could have anticipated. Pastor Ingrid's service as a founding board member for *Longfellow Rising* has brought Holy Trinity into close and regular contact with our neighbors in the last few months. Because of her work at the Lake Street Council, ZoeAna Martinez also brings a deep connection to and awareness of our immediate community. These connections and conversations will play an important and helpful role as we begin our discernment process in earnest.

Where do we go from here? Having completed the congregational survey and focus groups, the task force will begin the work of determining both the "what" and the "how" of stewarding these funds. The "what" will be a plan for the purpose of the funds, and the "how" will be a plan for the disbursement of the funds. The goal remains that a final proposal will be presented to the Church Council for approval at its January meeting and that, assuming Council approval, the same proposal will be presented to the full congregation at our annual meeting on January 31, 2021.

We intend to have at least one additional formal opportunity for response and comment by the congregation. Using the data and input we have collected, we will develop draft proposals and ask your help in refining and focusing them. In the meantime, we remain open to and interested in your feedback, ideas, and questions. We continue to monitor the Stepping Out in Faith email account (steppingout@htlcmpls.org) and encourage you to contact the task force to share your thoughts.

Just as the members of this congregation were faithful to invest in Trinity Apartments forty years ago, seeking to meet a need in the community, we now have a chance to step out in faith with this blessing of abundance and consider what role our congregation can play in building a more just future. Thank you for your continued prayers for and participation in this process!
