NATURE MEDITATIONS

Communities of Calling Small Group Reflection

I envisioned our time together this fall walking silently through prairie grasses and tall oaks and maples ablaze with color, watching and listening for what our Mother Earth and the Holy Spirit might want us to see and hear. Little did I know just how much I would also learn from each of the women I took these steps with. We had such beautiful gifts of friendship, consolation, wisdom, and laughter to offer one another, at least in part, because of how we were being gently pried open by soft breezes, the gurgling of brooks in our ears, the fall colors so intense that I sometimes had to look away, and on one occasion, the first snow of the season!

From our very first outing to Tamarack Nature Center in White Bear Lake on September 25, we were welcomed into these natural spaces as if our ancestors themselves were beckoning us. Perhaps the most startling realization for me was entering a grove of trees and feeling as if my grandmother, all our grandmothers, were calling to us to "come inside, and let us hold you all for a while." Even now, more than two months afterward, I feel a catch in my throat when I remember how very real that invitation was. What nurtured us just as deeply as our meandering through the

What nurtured us just as deeply as our meandering through the prairies and forests, were the lunches and conversations that we had afterward. After many months of lunching at home on our own, it was refreshing to hear different perspectives, new stories, and to be soaking in the pleasure of the faces we have so missed seeing in person.

One Friday, in a moment of reflection among the trees, and with my companions similarly engaged, I received these words of assurance in response to a deep restlessness I was feeling that day:

It's okay to plant yourself.

Your roots can grow deeper in search of nourishment nearby. Your branches can still reach toward the light and intermingle with the branches of your sisters and brothers. You can cradle the creatures who need you for shelter or safety. You can dance to the pulse of the elements of wind and rain, glorifying God for helping you accept what comes. It's okay to be planted. The journey is within.

I believe this was a gift from the trees. I'd like to think that had I been there that day by myself, I would have received the same gift, but in truth, I think it came as a result of being in the company of these sisters in faith, who helped this particular gift of grace appear; like midwives helping a resistant newborn move toward the light of day. I think there are a lot of things I would have missed seeing this fall without my companions. They've made a pretty good case for reaching out to one another, like roots of trees intermingling for sustenance, and branches extending themselves to the rest of the canopy for support. I thank God for Lois, Lynda, Arlene, Connie, and Jane; my newfound "Sisterwood."
