OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

I needed a place in which to warm up after spending hours looking around Chicago's Christkindlmarkt's many shops. Glittering stars, jolly carolers, and even the glühwein could not shoo away the icy fingers reaching from Lake Michigan into all the corners of the city. Walking into a nearby church I accidentally walked into a service, and I noticed a bulletin inviting me into a Service for the Longest Night. Having never experienced anything like it, I was intrigued and settled into the wooden bench on that Winter Solstice. Soon, hymns full of measured hope accompanied by readings which named the beauty and pain of being human warmed me up. I sat transfixed in that sacred moment within Lady Darkness into which I had stumbled.

It has been said, and I agree, that leading Christian narratives have equated darkness with sin which has led us (within this racialized society in which we live) to consciously and subconsciously think of hues of skin in this way, too. For those of us who revel in our melanin-rich skin spanning warm cinnamon to life-giving ebony, this simply does not make sense. And so we find ways by which to speak out against that which calls darkness bad, knowing that there is deep wisdom held within caramel hands carrying us into charcoal midnight. I invite you, then, into the fecundity of Darkness.

On 12 December 1531, Mary, the Mother of God, appeared miraculously in the frozen mountainsides of Mexico. She revealed herself as a brown-skinned person to a man who was a part of a conquered people. The indigenous people of Mexico had been subjugated under the Crown and Cross of Spain and had literally experienced an apocalypse. There would never be a turning back to a previous life. They could only hope to imagine a new future. And so, Our Lady of Guadalupe (Mary with warm-brown skin) joined them and carried them into a new day. It was in darkness and within the arms of a dark-skinned woman that new life was brought forth.

Today we perhaps find ourselves a bit confused and anxious as the holiday season rolls in. It may seem that there is nothing which can shoo away the coldness of what this year has brought – not even the strings of lights we hang and the candles we burn. I invite you to lean into the darkness around us and to continue to wrap yourselves and your loved ones in warm clothes as we wait. And it is my prayer that you will also stumble into sacred spaces and holy moments when you least expect them. That you will find that, although we can never go back to a previous way of being, there is certainly a new day coming. As we wait in this liminal space, we have those who cheer us on including our brown-skinned Lady of Guadalupe, Mary, who points us to Jesus. There is beauty, growth, and new life which springs from Lady Darkness. Take hope!
